Record Crowds

Leslie Hunter, the President of the Plowing Match, Hon. Kier Clark, Minister of Education; Messrs R. R. Bell, Leader of the Opposition; Stewart Wright, Deputy Minister of Agriculture; George Saville, M.L.A., W. J. Reid and W. A. Gaudet.

PLOWMEN START EARLY
The plowing itself was underway long before the opening ceremonies commenced. The plowmen were busy at mid-morning and before evening they had turned over sod upon sod in such workmanlike fashion that veteran plowmen were amazed at the quality of the work.

Plowmen like Douglas MacDonald of Forrest Hill who has competed at the Plowing Match almost since its inception in 1940 were marvelling at the improvement shown especially by the younger fellows.

Lawson Wood of Hazelbrook who "just came off the lun of the thing to show the young fellows a trick or two," was the winner of the Tractor three-sod event. There were eight competitors in the tractor 3-sod and their work provided veteran judge Wylie Baird with a tough task in making the placings.

Baird ranked Malcolm Matheson of Albion Cross behind Wood in the tractor 3-sod. This was the second time that Matheson has competed at the annual event and the second time he has been a runner-up.

He had planned to compete last year but when he got ready to plow he discovered that somebody had borrowed parts of his machinery.

Wendell MacLeod of Forrest Hill was third in the Tractor 3-sod event. Lawson had the straightest furrow and best crown while Mac Matheson had the best finish.

The tractor 2-sod event had the most entries of all. There were 17 entries. Garth Clay 21-year-old native of Bridgetown was the winner of the event.

Clay, who is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Robin Clay, plowed the straightest furrow and the best crown. Carl Willis of Cornwall, who placed second had the best finish.

The win was the first for Clay who has competed at the annual plowing match for several years.

Clayton Morrissey, another of the young plowing Morrisseys from Pownal, placed third and Malcolm MacRae of Cherry Valley fourth.

Freddy Nelson, 14 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Edison Nelson, Southport won the tractor event for boys and girls under 16 years.

The husky 165-pound Nelson, who plays hockey with Cherry Valley in the winter season, plowed the straightest furrow, and best finish.

Barry Wilson of Cornwall was second and Clarence D. Birt of Peakes third.

Young Athol McLeellan of Upton won the single furrow for boys and girls under 16 years. Wylie Taylor, who has done more than

his share of plowing around St. Peter's Bay, was second and M. J. Campbell, Primrose third.

McLeellan had the straightest furrow and best finish while Wylie Taylor had the best crown.

Truelove Taylor of Upton took top honors in the Gang Plow Senior event. He had the straightest furrow, best crown and best finish. Howard Taylor of Upton was second.

In the single furrow novices class Douglas MacDonald of Forrest Hill was first, Ray Burke of Strattona second and Carol Shephard, Forest Hill third.

TODAY'S CONTESTS
Plowing holds the spotlight today. This afternoon the winners of the various classes along with the champions of former years will compete for the Provincial championship.

John C. MacBeth of Forest Hill, retained his role as king of the Prince Edward Island potato exhibitors as his selection of Katahdins won the championship. This is the third successive year that Mr. MacBeth has won the potato crown.

Mr. Stewart Wright, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, suggested that the livestock show should be spread over the two days of the plowing match rather than concentrated in the opening day as is now the case.

He thought that all patrons should have an opportunity of seeing such a fine livestock display and he added that the exhibition was a great credit to the Province and to King's County in particular.

Mr. R. R. Bell congratulated President Leslie Hunter and the people of King's County for their initiative in going ahead and putting on a wonderful show. He stated that plowing matches do a lot of good as they get the people together to talk over their problems and get new ideas.

Mr. Bell stressed the point that the main problem facing Island farmers is getting their products on the market. "We must package and process what we grow here. We have the best agricultural province in Canada but quite often we do not get proper prices for our products," he stated.

Hon. Keir Clark extended his congratulations to President Hunter and his able board of directors for achieving such a notable success.

Mr. George Saville expressed the hope that the Plowing Match would be a further grant from the Government at the next sitting of the House and he pledged his support of such a proposal.

Immediately after the opening ceremonies the livestock judging got underway. About an hour later the sports events and dancing on the outdoor platform commenced.

Outstanding Cattle Show Presented At Provincial Plowing Match Yesterday

There were plenty of competition and high quality animals yesterday afternoon in the biggest cattle show ever presented at the 15-year-old Provincial Plowing Match at Dundas.

The lineups of animals in all classes drew the praise of veteran livestock men especially the Deputy Minister of Agriculture Stewart Wright who warmly complimented the exhibitors for their magnificent display.

The judges were busy in the cattle ring throughout the afternoon as they placed the Holsteins, Ayrshires and Jerseys in the dairy breeds and the Hereford and Red Foll in the beef breeds.

Ingbrook Vines, an eight year old cow owned by Earl Ings and Son, Mount Herbert, won the grand and senior female championships in the Ayrshire classes. Edwin Reid and Son of Rollo Bay won reserve honors.

The Ings also showed the grand champion Ayrshire male with four year old Ingbrook Dynamic taking the honors. Brent Stead and Son of Fortune Bridge had the male reserve.

A 12 year old cow owned by R. L. Burge of St. Peter's Bay that only last week was graded "Excellent" was adjudged grand champion female in the Holstein show.

This animal, Vale Pabst Bountiful also won the senior championship. Charles S. MacDonald of Souris showed the grand reserve female.

Howard Dixon of Fortune Bridge won the junior female championship with his junior yearling Dixonhill Sally. Dixon also won the grand and junior championship with Dixonhill Duke while R. L. Burge with Abegweit Comet won reserve grand.

Arthur MacDonald and Douglas Matheson of St. Peter's Bay won all the championships in the Jersey classes with the grand champion female and reserve in the Jersey female championship.

Rivernorth Dawn's Roger, a two year old sire owned by Matheson, was judged grand champion male while Lulu May Star, a six year old cow owned by Arthur MacDonald, won the grand female championship.

Matheson was female reserve grand. L. J. Buell and Son of Murray Harbor showed the grand champion female and reserve in the Hereford classes. C. W. Townsend and Sons of Fortune Bridge won the Grand Championship in the male classes.

Reg Red Poll classes was won by Reg Mellish of New Perth. Athol Roberts of Southport showed the champion female beef animal and won the Eastern Potato Chips special prize.

Honors in the Holsteins classes were divided among Howard Dixon of Fortune Bridge, R. L. Burge, St. Peter's Bay and Charles S. MacDonald of Souris.

In the Ayrshire classes there was a greater number of exhibitors with Earl Ings and Son, Gavin Reid and Son, Rollo Bay; Brent Stead and Son, Fortune Bridge; N. W. MacLeod and Sons, Bridgetown; and Floyd Thompson, Lower Montague winning their share of honors.

The three top winners in the Jersey classes were Arthur MacDonald, Doug Matheson and Ernest Underhay.

L. J. Buell and Son were the major winners in the Hereford classes with C. W. Townsend and Sons also showing well.

In what was termed as one of the greatest shows ever presented on an Island stage, Gene Autry and all the gang from Melody Ranch, Hollywood, held huge audiences spellbound at the Forum yesterday.

The famed film and radio cowboy and his gang sang, danced, rode and roped their way through four hours roaring applause, hilarious laughter and wide-eyed amazement in two big performances, afternoon and evening. Everything from soft melodies by the Cass County Boys to gun shots and Indians were included in the show which was staged before an estimated 3,000 delighted adults and children.

The great climax of the performance came when Gene in his big ten-gallon hat and spurs appeared with Champion and Little Champ to do the tricks for which they are well known in many movies.

When Gene sang such songs as "Back In The Saddle Again" and "In The Blue Canadian Rockies," the spectators, in wonderment, were taken on a brief trip to both the open plains and the snow-capped mountains.

They greatly appreciated the amazing feats performed by the Strong trio with their bull whips and lariats, stared in reminiscence at the ceremonial dances of the Jemez Indians from Albuquerque, New Mexico, and cheered with delight the hair-raising feats of acrobat Hubert Castle.

Then there was the spectacular juggling, baton an unicycle act by Lorraine Stevens, the music and dance by the tap-dancer and xylophonist, Ely Elsters, and the comedy by Pat Buttram and Rufe Davis. Equally prominent was the performance of Carl Cotner with his violin.
