Local and Other Items.

BIG STRIKE OF CARPENTERS.—There are upwards of 8000 carpenters and joiners on strike in New York City. They want their wages increased from \$3.50 to \$4 a day.

THE CAMPANA.—The Campana left port last night about 10 o'clock for Montreal. She had a large cargo, which included 2,200 cheese and 1,000 cases eggs. Some passengers went by her.

CIVIC ELECTION.—In the election at Summerside yesterday, Mr. S. H. Clarke was elected by a majority of 45 over Mr. Geo Gardiner. The election was to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Councillor McLeod.

SUFFOCATED BY GAS.—Emily Armstrong and Lottie Armstrong, wife and sister respectively of J. S. Armstrong, of Sault Ste. Marie, were suffocated with gas last Saturday night. On Sunday morning the gas in their room was found half turned on. Both victims had been dead some time.

SCHOONER LOST.—The schooner Andrew Barnham, owned by J H Myrick & Co., is reported lost off Bermuda. She had a cargo of sugar which was also owned by J. H. Myrick & Co. The schooner was not insured. The freight, supplies and cargo were insured. The crew were saved.

KILLED BY A CAT.—A Mrs. O'Neill, of Toronto, had an adopted baby six weeks old. Last Saturday night on going to the room she found a huge cat leaning over it on the bed. Driving the animal away she found that it had gnawed off the baby's nose and part of one temple. The child died the following night.

HANDSOME MEDALS.—Two very handsome medals—a silver and a bronze—were received here yesterday by the Secretary of the Provincial Rifle Association from the Earl of Minto, the Governor General. They were won at the recent P. R. A. matches by Major H. M. Davison, No 1 Company, C. A., and Lieut. H. R. Lordly, of the Charlottetown Engineers. CANADIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS.—At the Canadian championships in Toronto on Saturday three Canadian records were broken. They were the running broad jump, in which A C Kraenzlein, N Y A C, made 23 feet 6 1/2 inches. The old record was 23 feet 1 3/8 inches. The running high jump, J Baxer, N Y A C, 6 feet 2 1/2 inches; old record, 6 feet 1 1/16 inches. Throwing sixteen pound hammer, J S Flanagan, N Y A C, 155 feet 5 inches; old record, 155 feet 3 inches. The only maritime province competitor was Stephen, the Halifax crack, who won the first heat of the hundred yards in 10 4/5, and finished second to Kraenzlein in the final, in 10 2/5. In the 220 yards he finished second to Loog, N Y A C, in 22 1/5.

FOOT BADLY CRUSHED.—The following paragraph from a British Columbia paper refers to the accident spoken of in yesterday's EXAMINER: "Jim. Lafferty, engineer in McDowell's tug boat, is at St. Paul's hospital with a badly crushed foot as a result of an accident on the boat last night. Lafferty's foot was caught in the machinery of the engine as a result of a heavy fall. Officer McKeown and Mr. McDowell removed the injured man as quickly as possible from the wharf. The hospital authorities say that amputation of the injured foot may not be necessary." A telegram was sent yesterday enquiring as to Mr. Lafferty's condition and the reply was to the effect that he was doing very well.
