CONTRACT BRIDGE

THE WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

For the fourth successive year, a European team last month won the world contract bridge championship. The victory by an Italian team of six players was won at Lake Como, Italy, in a three-cornered match against teams from the United States and Argentina.

This same group of Italian experts had previously won the European championship for the second year in a row in a tournament staged in Vienna last summer with seventeen countries participating. Moreover, they had captured the world title in 1957, when they traveled to New York to take on and crush an American team headed by Charles Goren.

The record speaks for itself. The Italians have a first-rate team which dominates the bridge world today just as American teams did in the first four years of international competition starting in 1950. The score is now tied, with the United States and Europe each having garnered four victories in the eight years of battle for the Crownshield Cup.

The margin of victory this year was the smallest since the inception of the annual event. The Italians outscored the American team by 37 international match points. (An IMP is roughly the equivalent of 100 points scored at rubber bridge.) Had the Americans avoided error in just three or four hands of the 164 played, they would have emerged triumphant.

Indonesian Army Makes Victory Claims

SINGAPORE (AP)—President Sukarno's Indonesian army claimed Monday that it has regained control of the airport and harbor at Medan in north Sumatra and that insurgents have withdrawn from the strategic city.

The claim was described as false by the rebel radio at Padang in central Sumatra, which Sunday announced capture of the island's largest city by troops who mutinied against the Sukarno regime. The city has a population of 300,000.

However, a Medan broadcast supported the government announcement of recapture of the city.

Although the rebels disputed the government claims, they appeared convinced that Maj. Boyke Nain Golan and the mutinous battalion he led against the government Sunday could not hold the city alone.

Russians Very Active In North

NEW YORK (CP)—The New York Times says more than 500 groups of Russian scientists made explorations on Arctic ice floes from 1954 through 1956. At more than two dozen points, scientists were within 200 miles of Canada's Arctic island shores.

The story says the scientists made 524 landings at points that blanket the entire North Pole area from the Soviet Union to Canada in a massive Soviet exploratory effort.

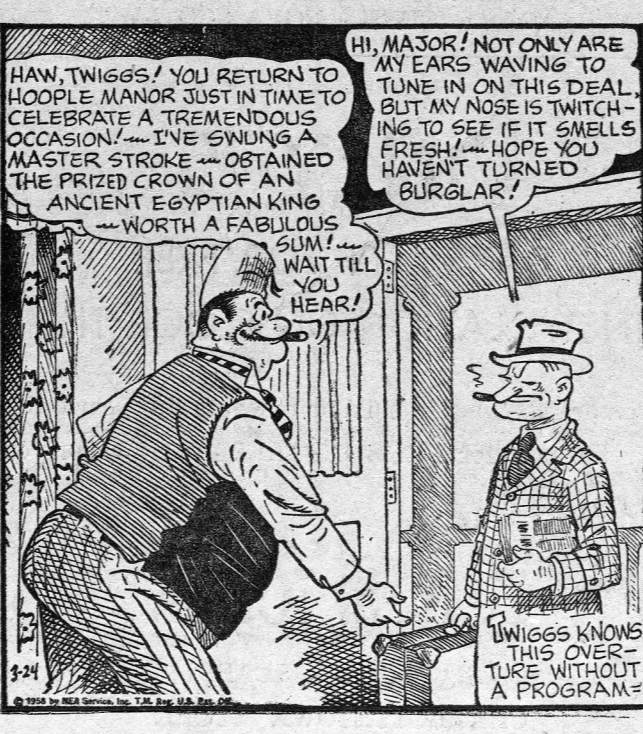

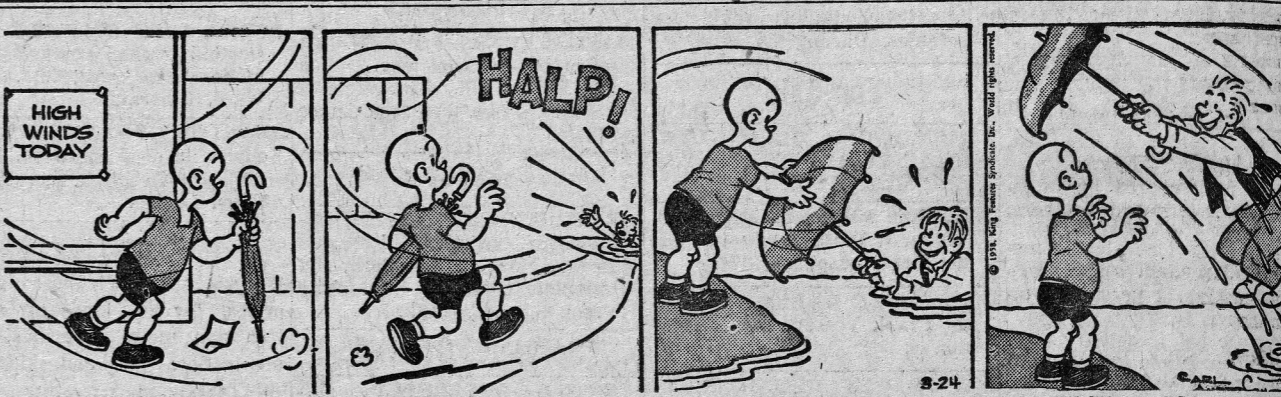
