## NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.

### Mowat, Mills and Ministers.

### Speculation About the Appointment.

OTTAWA, Sept. 23.—Sir Richard Cartwright declines to say anything regarding the Atlantic Mail Service contract which expires in November.

The Premier has taken up his permanent residence in Ottawa.

The expected announcement concerning Sir Oliver Mowat's resignation is still delayed.

It is said that James Sutherland, M. P., and James Lister, M. P., have objections to the Hon. David Mills coming into the Cabinet and that Mr. Charlton, M. P., is here to urge his claim for a Cabinet position.

Although Dalton McCarthy's name is mentioned in connection with the portfolio of Justice it is almost certain that Mr. Mills will get it.

Sir Charles Tupper will not likely return to Ottawa much before January next.

## CAMPAIGN IN LONDON.

### Rebels Taking Their Punishment.

SIMLA, Sept. 23.—The brigade of General Jeffries, continues its task of punishing the rebel tribes. Yesterday Umra Khan's village of Zogai, was chastised.

General Jeffries encountered but small opposition, though several sepoy, of the Afridi tribe deserted with rifles and ammunition. One of the Afridi tribe killed a fellow sentry and a Sikh deserted.

After the attack on General Blood, at Karika, last evening, the enemy left twenty dead upon the field and carried off the bodies of many of those killed.

ST. JOHN, Sept. 23.—The Fredericton Gleaner gives currency to a report that County Judge Headman will be retired and that William Wilson ex-M. P. P., be appointed in his place. Wilson is the man who held the Star Chamber enquiry in Moncton.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

OTTAWA, Sept. 21.—At the sealing conference meeting at Washington about the middle of November Prof. Darcy Thompson will represent the British government and J. M. Macgowan of the geological survey the Canadian government.

HAZELTOWN, Pa., Sept. 21.—Peace has been restored in the anthracite region and nearly every colliery therein worked today.

SYRACUSE, Sept. 20.—When Patrick Bresnahan picked up the morning papers yesterday he was surprised to find full accounts of his tragic death by a railroad accident last evening. He also learned that his remains were lying in a down town morgue, having been fully identified by two of his own brothers. Mr. Bresnahan hurried down to the morgue to take a look at himself, and found there a shockingly mangled body, from which the life had been crushed by the wheels of a freight train under which it had fallen. The coroner had summoned a jury to officially determine why and how Mr. Bresnahan came to his death, but the appearance of that individual required a change in the proceedings, and now he is trying to find out who the dead man is.

HALIFAX, Sept. 20.—Capt. D. Campbell, of the steamer Barcelona, is in possession of information that his family is heir to a large estate in Scotland. The estate is situated in the island of Barra, on the western coast of Scotland, and is supposed to be very valuable.

SOUTHAMPTON, Sept. 20.—The new twin screw steamship Kaiser Wilhelm Der Grosse of the North German Lloyd line, has arrived here from Bremen. She attained an average speed of 20 7 knots per hour with 68 revolutions of her engines in the minute. The engines worked smoothly. The Kaiser Wilhelm Der Grosse carries 755 passengers.

COPENHAGEN, Sept. 21.—A despatch received here from Hammerfest, the northernmost town of Europe, in Norway says the whaling ship Folken has brought there the third pigeon despatch by Prof. Andree the aeronaut, who left the Island of Tromsøe in a balloon on July 11 last, in an attempt to cross the polar region. The message brought by the Folken reads:—"July 13, 12.30 p. m., latitude 82.2 north, longitude 12.5 east—Good voyage eastward. All well."

NEW YORK, September 20.—Evelyn B. Baldwin, the meteorologist of the Pear expedition, was interviewed yesterday by the Association Press regarding the latest pigeon despatch from Andree. Mr. Baldwin said: "This message indicates that Andree had safely crossed the 150 miles or so of open water which extends from the north coast of Spitzbergen to the beginning of the pack ice. When Andree wrote it, he was sailing over the great frozen sea which reaches continuously to and beyond the North Pole. It is evident that the loss of the three guide ropes, which occurred on the day Andree started, had not prevented him from guiding the balloon. Some expert aeronauts feared that this accident might bring speedy disaster. It is also evident that the unbelieving aeronauts who declared that the gas in the balloon would never stand the temperature of the pack ice were wrong. If the extreme cold caused any perceptible change in the gases, such action would have taken place before Andree wrote this last message. And if the cold had done the work so much feared, Andree would not have said 'All well'." It is significant to note that Andree was going eastward, the direction he intended to take. This is a straw which helps to verify his reported safe reappearance in Arctic Russia. The tenths of degrees given in his message proved that Andree was not only able from the balloon to ascertain his whereabouts, but did so with remarkable accuracy. The first three days were looked upon as being the most perilous and important of the entire journey. Andree's ability successfully to withstand the initial difficulties augurs better than the lay mind would imagine for the culmination of his daring project."

### PROFESSOR BUELL AT VERNON RIVER.

A fair audience attended at the Catholic Church, at Vernon River, on Sunday evening to witness the beautiful and artistic entertainment given by Professor Buell. Needless to say all enjoyed a rare treat. The large church afforded a grand opportunity to display the pictures to good advantage and the Professor was in good condition to explain each of the views as they passed before the audience. The performance opened with an overture by Mr. Frank R. O'Neill on the violin while his sister Miss Mary O'Neill presided at the organ throughout the entertainment. The first pictures projected were scenes from Egypt, and then passing into Europe he showed scenes in Rome, France, Germany, Switzerland, &c. He next brought his audience to England, Scotland and Ireland during which the choir sang appropriate pieces, amongst which were "Annie Laurie" by Miss Eliza O'Neill and "Kilarney" by Mr. John Green. After this he passed to Newfoundland, giving views of the coast of that Island, coming to Cape Breton, Nova Scotia and P. E. Island. At this place the choir sang "Home Sweet Home" with grand effect. The Professor then brought his hearers into Quebec, Montreal, Winnipeg, over the Rockies, into Vancouver and British Columbia, showing them the principal places of interest along the route, and finished by displaying four or five views of Vernon River taken by him about ten days ago.

The music was excellent throughout and added greatly to the entertainment. The performance lasted about three hours and was enjoyed very much by those who were fortunate enough to be present, all of whom felt that they were deeply indebted to Professor and Mrs. Buell for their magnificent spectacle, and to Rev. Dr. Doyle for his good judgment and forethought in procuring for them an evening of genuine enjoyment.
