

# Decline Reported In Milk, Butter

It was learned from H.J. MacDonald, provincial dairy superintendent, that milk production in the first seven months of this year has dropped more than 10,500,000 pounds from the 1962 total of 117,153,000 pounds. Also up until the end of August butter production was down some 11 per cent, 5,976,000 pounds to 5,539,000 pounds. Cheese production rose slightly this year to 678,000 pounds for the first eight months. September figures are not yet available — from the 542,000 pounds in the same period a year ago.

The increase in cheese production is due mainly to a subsidy of 30 cents per 100 pounds paid on milk going into cheese manufacture, observed Mr. MacDonald, who agreed that the slight increase in cheese would account for but very little of the drop in butter.

**POOR HAY REASON**  
The poor quality hay fed to the cattle last winter, is a big factor in the decline in dairy production to date, Mr. MacDonald added.

Storage stocks of butter in Canada at the end of August this year were 158.2 million pounds, but the total jumps to slightly more than 200 million pounds when the butter-oil holdings are added. The holdings are considerably higher than they were a year ago.

Storage stocks in the Maritimes, Mr. MacDonald said, are 1,334,000 pounds which is practically shelf-bare, considering the quantity of butter in the three provinces. Butter will be coming in to the Maritimes in early autumn, he predicted, to fill the consumer need.

Rivermore Dairy Fe produced 10,990 milk, 451 fat for BCAs of 133 and 134 for D. Fred MacRae, Hunter River as a mature cow. Bell Fountains Both produced 10,126 milk, 419 fat for BCAs of 130 and 122 in the same class for Windsor Bell, South Charlottetown.

Also in the mature class is Fairview Melody 2, with 10,224 milk, 469 fat for BCAs of 129 and 122 for A. MacIsaac and Sons, Charlottetown RR. Charlottetown Trim No. 9 produced 10,821 milk, 452 fat for BCAs of 132 and 143 as a junior four-year old for the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown.
