## New Banking Era Seen With Branch Opening

Another step in the post-war expansion of The Royal Bank of Canada was officially completed here today with the opening for business of the new Charlottetown Branch building at the corner of Queen and Richmond streets.

A new era of banking was ushered in for the Royal here with the doors of the gleaming aluminum-glass granite building swinging open at 10 a.m.

Built on the site of the bank's former building, the completely new edifice has taken its place among the more than 960 branches of The Royal Bank of Canada spread across the nation and in many other parts of the world.

Though to some the new building may seem radical in design, the architects have maintained with contemporary materials and construction methods the traditional form of banking appointments.

The building is indeed a far cry from the original premises which, for almost a 100 years, served as the Royal Bank's headquarters for Prince Edward Island. The old building, which was a Charlottetown landmark, was demolished in the fall of 1957 and in the interim, the bank carried on in temporary quarters located in the old Post Office building.

Manager of the Royal's Charlottetown Branch is L.D. MacKay who has been in charge here since 1955.

### Ch'town Lady Is Dead At 80

The death of Miss Mary Elizabeth Haszard, in her 80th year, occurred at her home at 95 Fitzroy Street, Charlottetown, yesterday morning, Dec. 13.

She was the daughter of the late Hon. Francis Longworth Haszard, Judge of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island and previously Premier, and Elizabeth DesBrisay.

Miss Haszard served in England and France in the nursing service for about two years during the First World War. She was Mentioned in Despatches. In 1922-1923 she took a public health nursing course at the University of Toronto and later engaged in public health nursing in Halifax. She returned to Charlottetown to take care of her parents.

Miss Haszard was a parishioner of St. Paul's Anglican Church. She was long active in the IOOE, the Legion, the Charlottetown Riding Club and the Belvedere Golf Club.

She is survived by three sisters and one brother, Helen, Mrs. Leigh Spencer, Ganges, B.C., Ethel, Mrs. Harry Jones, Calgary, Alta., Hilda, Mrs. H.L. Claxton, Shelburne, N.S., and Dr. J. F. Haszard, Kimberly, B.C.

## Jury Says Death Was Accidental

At an inquest held at city police court on Saturday afternoon, the jury after a brief deliberation, found that Mary Elisabeth McIsaac died on Dec. 7, of internal injuries received when she was struck by a car on Upper Prince Street, Dec. 6th at approximately 7 p.m. The jury said there was no indication of negligence on the part of anyone concerned.

Drs. Robert Abel and Frank Burge both agreed that the little girl was haemorrhaging internally when brought to the hospital as a result of ruptured blood vessels leading to the kidneys and Dr. Burge said that the girl was at no time strong enough to undergo surgery. "Surgery would have been to little avail at any rate," he said.

Mrs. Leo P. McIsaac, mother of the little girl, told the court that her little girl had emerged from the right hand door of the car, circled behind the car and started to cross the street. None of the occupants of the McIsaac car saw any oncoming vehicle.

### FROM BEHIND CAR

In his testimony, John Ernest Davies, driver of the car that struck the girl, said that the girl had darted from behind the parked McIsaac car and came into contact with his car at the moment that he began to brake his vehicle.

One witness, Nelson Livingstone, told the court that he was following shortly behind Mr. Davies car and he estimated Davies speed at about 15 mph, and was quite certain that the lights of Davies car were on.

Const. Norton of the Charlottetown police told the hearing that his investigation, showed the Davies car to be in excellent mechanical condition. Due to the body solidity of the car, no dents or scratches were visible on the car except mud smears possibly caused by cloth coming in contact with the fender.

When asked why a complete investigation was not made at the scene of the accident, Constable Charles Ready who was on duty at the time of the accident told the court that the department was not notified of the happening until after the victim was taken to hospital and both cars involved had been removed from the scene. Outside of a routine accident report, little could be done at the time.

Jury foreman was Sydney Stead and the other members were P. A. VanDerstine, John MacLure, Roy MacGillivray, Frank MacDonald and Clark Irwin. The seventh member Wendell Beaton was unable to attend due to illness.

The coroner was Dr. C. A. Coady with Police Chief MacArthur, and Crown Prosecutor Gerald R. Foster present.
