Women's Role Important For Successful Centennial

The dramatic story of women's role in Canadian history will be illustrated in a book to be prepared by the Canadian Federation of University Women, an organization which has been awarded a grant of \$3,500 for the purpose.

In announcing the grant made under the Centennial Publications Assistance Program of the Centennial Commission, John Fisher, Centennial Commissioner, stressed that this project is but one instance of the role to be played in the 1967 celebrations both by women and by universities. Mr. Fisher was speaking at the recent dinner meeting of the University Women's Club of Ottawa.

He added that the plans of the Centennial Commission call for encouragement of universities both in the intellectual field and in the development of physical fitness. "Cultural growth," he said, "goes with physical betterment. They are interdependent."

To help universities share in the Centennial celebrations to the utmost, Mr. Fisher pointed out that the Centennial Commission has entered into an agreement with the Association of Universities Centennial Program. This program will include visits to campuses by notable lecturers and artists; the touring of a bilingual play—to be produced under the direction of notable directors and with student actors from universities across the country; a series of historical seminars which will study select areas of Canadian history, and a number of learned conferences and seminars.

Mr. Fisher concluded by saying that all the other programs launched by the Commission and other federal authorities will stem from the intention to mark the achievements of the past generations to come, in a Confederation which has not only survived but progressed in spite of difficulties. "The larger and the more direct the participation of all Canadians in the 1967 celebrations," he said, "the more our birthday will be successful and the better the future of our country will be ensured."





Sure-Fire Suggestions For Summer Cookout

These furnishing, department and variety stores are displaying gadgets and utensils that intrigue every bride-to-be. These include small whisks; egg slicers; brushes of all kinds; sets of measuring cup and spoons; cooking thermometers; beautiful shining aluminum skillets and saucapans (some Teflon-lined); stainless steel tableware vegetable peelers; kebab skewers; aluminum coffee makers; decorative copper-colored aluminum molds to hang or use; aluminum strainers, strong and durable — everything needed to start a modern kitchen.

At an "after work" shower, it is good planning to serve a buffet supper first (the boy friends of the girls present are often invited), and afterwards everyone enjoys watching the bride-to-be unwrap the parcels.

DELIGHTFUL SHOWER SUPPER MENU
(Easy-to, almost no dish - washing)
Shrimp and Crabmeat (canned)
M's a la king sauce (canned)
Served in Pate Shells (Baker or Supermarket Molded Fresh - with whipped Cream or Ice Cream Coffee)

Use plastic coated paper plates and cups and paper napkins.

In Advance: Order all supplies. The evening before, make the gelatin and refrigerate.

An hour before the party: Rinse the canned shrimp with cold water. Flake the crabmeat in bite-size pieces (remove connective hard cartilage). Combine the shellfish with the a la king sauce. Add dry sherry to taste. Slow-heat until ready to serve. Meantime heat the pate shells in a slow oven. Make the gelatin; refrigerate.

Note: For 12 guests, order 4 (7 oz.) cans shrimp, 4 (7 oz.) cans crabmeat, and 4 cans a la king sauce.

Chilled Shredded Pineapple - Roast Chicken and Gravy.

Orange Rice, Creamed Young Onions with Sliced Carrots, Lemon Sherbet with Sugared Strawberries and Sour Cream Coffee, Tea, Milk.

Measurements level; recipes for 6

ORANGE RICE

6 tbsp. butter or margarine
1 1/3 c. diced celery and chopped tender celery leaves
3 tbs. minced peeled onion
3 c. water
2 c. orange juice, or canned or frozen orange juice diluted by following pkg. directions
1 tbs. grated orange rind
1/4 tsp. salt
2 c. white rice

Melt butter in heavy 2 1/2 qt. saucepan; add celery and onion slow-cook until onion is tender, but do not brown. Add water, orange juice, orange rind, and salt. Bring to boil; add rice slowly. Cover; reduce heat; simmer 25 min.
