Ottawa East Liberal Rift May Lead To 3 Candidates

OTTAWA (CP)—A rift among Liberal supporters in Ottawa East has widened as a dissident group announced plans for a nominating convention March 7 and the constituent association planned a separate meeting.

The possibility grew that two and perhaps three candidates will run as Liberals in the April 15 federal election.

The split developed Feb. 12 when the association executive voted to nominate a candidate at a time MP J. T. Richard as Liberal candidate without holding a nominating convention.

The three dissidents, led by treasurer Yves Pariseau, resigned and called for a convention. Tuesday Mr. Pariseau and Aime Politras jointly announced the formation of an "interim committee" to organize a nominating convention for March 7.

At the same time Horace Rasmussen, president of the constituent association, said his group will convene a general meeting, but not a convention, within the next two weeks. He said he will

British Imports Show New Trend

LONDON (Reuters)—British imports from the European Common Market and surrounding area countries dropped in January from average monthly totals for the first six months of the year.

The January figure for Common Market imports was £25,200,000 (\$102,000,000), compared with an average monthly total of £21,000,000 (\$84,000,000) last year.

Last year's sterling area imports, after seasonal adjustments, stood at £134,000,000 monthly but had dropped to £120,000,000 (\$480,000,000) in January this year.

The Federation of British Industries announced Tuesday it had signed an unofficial trade agreement for 1963 with West German Chamber of Commerce.

Since Britain does not recognize the East German regime, trade between the two countries is arranged by third party organizations, not by the governments themselves.

The agreement provides for British exports totaling £5,500,000 (\$22,000,000) and imports totaling £10,000,000 (\$40,000,000) in the first quarter of 1963.

A federation spokesman said Britain would sell chemicals, glass, and a number of scientific instruments and iron, steel and non-ferrous metals.

The East Germans would sell machinery, cameras, scientific instruments, typewriters and a number of other goods.

QUIZ

Your partner deals and bids 2 Notrump. This is the case when one partner bids all, or practically all, the high cards.

2. Six notrump. This is simply a matter of arithmetic. 0-12 or 23 or 24 bring us to 34, 35 or 36 points. Only 33 points is a reasonable score for a grand slam. We therefore go right to the slam without further ceremony.

3. Three hearts. Naturally, high-card points are not the sole criteria in judging whether or there is a game. We have only 3 points in high cards, but the six cards suit is the equivalent of 3 more. We can probably take five or six tricks with hearts as trump, and the hand is therefore appraised with that in mind. If partner responds four hearts, we pass; if his bid is three notrump, we go on to four hearts.

4. Four notrump. This bid has nothing to do with Blackwood. It is simply a raise in notrump that requests partner to pass with minimum values, or go on to six with maximum values for his two notrump bid. With 10 points we can't be sure whether the combined values are 23 or 24 points.

5. Three diamonds. The hand looks promising, even with 17 high-card points, and the intention is to contract for a slam eventually in one of our suits. However, the proper trump suit must be found and we therefore follow the usual procedure of first naming the higher ranking of two five-card suits.

If partner's rebid is three notrump, we then bid four clubs. Presumably, he will bid four diamonds or five clubs, and we can then contract for six in the suit of his choice.
