

CURRENT NOTES.

Private advices from Berlin state that Emperor William is worse. He cannot talk or do the least work without fits of somnolency.

The new Indian Government will establish a regular consulate at Kashgar; it is understood that China has consented to the arrangement.

St. Petersburg advices point to an early conference between Baron de Staal and the Marquis of Salisbury, regarding a resumption of negotiations on the Afghan frontier question.

The Pope will create six new cardinals at the Consistory to be held on the 11th July. At the same Consistory His Holiness will also announce the name of the new Archbishop of Dublin.

Lord Wolsey has received a report that Oliver Paine has died of fever. The report has not been confirmed at Paris, however, where more credence is given to the recent report that the Mahdi had sent him to India and that he has arrived at Pondicherry disguised as a Catholic clergyman.

Sir Stafford Northcote, in a farewell address to his constituents says:—"At the present anxious and critical moment it is everybody's duty to place heartily and unreservedly his services at the disposal of his Sovereign, and to the best of his ability to defend the true interests of the Empire, to uphold law and order and good government.

Advices from Port Stanley, Falkland Islands, of May 7, says: "The bark Hermine, Capt. Jones, will sail soon for her destination. The Captain has been acquitted of the charge of homicide in killing a seaman. The Hermine left Liverpool, January 18, for Victoria, B. C. A mutiny occurred on board and the captain shot a seaman. The vessel put into Port Stanley and the captain was arrested and held for trial."

A rare instance of Christian toleration is exemplified in Anrau, where Protestants and Catholics occupy the same church. On New Year's Eve it was filled, and the whole congregation united in singing a hymn, after which the Catholic choir executed a piece of music. The priest and pastor then alternately spoke on the religious thoughts appropriate to the close of the year, and on the good relations that should exist between Christians.

A Winnipeg despatch says that Geo. Kerr, just returned from Batouche, says a good deal of suffering will likely be felt among the poor people. No crops are in, the men being mostly away, and those at home are seeking employment as freighters. The half-breeds do not care whether Riel hangs or not, but do not want to see him again. They take no stock in his new religion. After Riel was arrested he told them he would be hanged, but that he would be back with them in a year.

The Halifax Herald reports that the mackerel fleet are widely scattered and are meeting with poor success. Seventy-five sail put into Provincetown, Monday, to escape the heavy southwest breeze and reported, had cruised from Cape Cod to Mount Desert and off shore to Georges and seen but few fish. Schr. Emma Higgins, has six blbs., the result of four weeks' work. Two or three of the fleet were from the south, where fish appear to be more plenty. Schr. Lizzie Baker had 180 blbs., good fish, taken near No. Man's Land. About fifty seiners put into Boothbay the same day for shelter from high wind, reporting poor success. A number of the fleet have gone to the Bay St. Lawrence to seek mackerel.

The St. James Gazette says the King of the Belgians is about the only European sovereign who was born to a throne and reached it. King Humbert was seventeen years old before a kingdom of Italy existed. The King of Greece is the founder of a dynasty. Don Carlos is watching to pounce upon the crown of the young Alfonso. The spectre of assassination glowered upon the coronation ceremonies of the Czar. It was an act of abdication that made Francis Joseph Emperor of Austria. The Kings of Prussia, Portugal, and Sweden were born younger sons, the King of Denmark a distant cousin and the Queen of England but fifth in succession to the reigning sovereign.

General Gordon was the only individual in the British nation. Every other man can be more or less classified, and will have leanings more or less toward one leader or another. Gordon's diary is a sort of fire-work show, sputtering out sparks on all sides equally, astonishing everybody, pleasing nobody. Gordon appears in it, however, in a less inconsequent light than in his epigrammatic proclamations and despatches. He had a clear policy and one which accords with all the broken flashes that have escaped from him—a policy which will be more generally consented to know that the mischief is done that it could have been before. His opinion was that England's honor required the release of the helpless Egyptian garrisons, seeing that England was, to some extent, responsible for their being in the fix they were in. This he would have done with a few hundred men, and without artillery, which he declared to have been the bane of all the Sudan campaigns. For permanent policy he would have handed the country over to Turkey, and, we presume, governed it in the name of the Turks. In other words, he would have

used Turkish troops instead of English as an army of occupation—a force which would have borne the dangers of the desert better, and whose reverses, had such occurred, would have reflected less harm on England.
