**Let's Talk It Over**

There should be a special "Safety Week" during the very last week of school. Children in many schools are pretty well through with their final exams by then, and the last week is sometimes not a very busy one from the standpoint of study. With normal weather, the last week in June is not a time to require too much concentration on books from junior students. What a chance to impress on the children the importance of care during the two summer months when both the car traffic and the children traffic increase in our streets, making the chances of accident about four times as great as at other times.

The teachers could have a regular schedule of instruction for this "Safety Week." One day could be devoted to water safety, one to safety in the home, and one to exercising extra care in the increased traffic of the summer months. No instruction could possibly be more important than this. All the geography, history and English you have taught to a youngster is useless once he has been hit by that terrific engine of destruction, the modern car. By all means, caution the motorist to be extra careful, too. But about seventy-five percent of the negligence can be traced to the unfortunate child victim himself.

We might be accused of playing the part of Kipling's "Old Men" by "after the smoke of the battle is over, Ambling into the fray," but it is not too early to talk about a matter such as this a year in advance. Even when a solon arises and gives very wise advice, those concerned do not immediately exclaim: "Well, what are we waiting for? Let's do it." They wisely consider its every angle, and make innovations with deliberation and care. We think the time will come when a great deal of attention will be given to training children to look after themselves in this age of greater and greater speed.

The Panmunjom peace talks have passed their first anniversary. Never before in the world's history have nations sought compromise for a full year, and found so little. Two world factions diametrically opposed to each other in their ideologies continue to go through the masquerade of arbitration because each fears that if it dropped the peace talks, it would jeopardize their position in the opinion of the rest of the world. Unfortunately the righteousness of our cause is not always readily discernible to all the peoples of the world, nor are the intrigues and evil designs of the Soviet always understood by these peoples.

**O'Leary School Annual Meeting**

The annual meeting of the O'Leary School district was held in the school on Tuesday night, June 24th, with a representative number of ratepayers present. Mr. Alton Rayner, one of the Village Commissioners, was chairman and Mr. Ralph Ozon was secretary.

A fine report was given by Dr. L. G. Dewar on the distinct possibility of getting grade eleven in O'Leary. Dr. Dewar told of a delegation composed of himself, Mrs. Upton Seaman, one of the school trustees, and Mr. Alton Rayner, one of the Village Commissioners, who interviewed Dr. L. W. Shaw, Director of Education in Charlottetown and also the members of the Provincial Government, including the Premier, Hon. J. Walter Jones.

They were very kindly and graciously received, Dr. Dewar reported, and the delegation was told that the chance of having Grade Eleven in O'Leary was good. The meeting thanked Dr. Dewar and the members of his committee for their good work. Dr. Dewar reported that he was talking to Dr. L. W. Shaw on the evening of June 24th by phone and he was given to understand that the Department of Education would co-operate with the village and there was a good possibility that the students of O'Leary and district getting their grade ten, would be able to take their grade eleven in O'Leary.

Mr. Dewar was re-appointed auditor, and the inspector's report showed that the school property is in excellent shape.

The annual report was read, showing receipts of \$6,975.21 and in bank, balance forward, of \$1133.38. Total \$8,108.59. Expenditures were as follows:—Capital, \$2,895.18; ordinary, \$3583.35; bank balance as at June 24th, \$1630.06; total, \$8,108.59. Outstanding taxes unpaid only amounted to \$357 and that amount will shortly be forthcoming. This is due to the excellent service of the secretary, Mr. Leslie MacAulay. A debt of \$10,700 remains on the new school.

The teachers' supplements were all increased \$50 as follows: Principal, \$600; Vice Principal, \$400; and the other two teachers \$350 each. The sum of \$200 was voted to repair the basement.

Mr. Claude Jelly, retiring trustee, was re-elected for another

term. The meeting decided to ask the Dept. of Education for a map of the village of O'Leary and went on record as favoring free school books, as in the Province of Nova Scotia and other Provinces, when such a move is feasible. An amount totalling \$3500 was budgeted for ordinary expenses and \$2500 on account.


