OATH OF ALLEGIANCE

"I swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Second, her Heirs and Successors, according to law, and that I will faithfully observe the laws of Canada and fulfill my duties as a Canadian Citizen. So help me God." (Canadian Citizenship Act, January 1, 1947.)

On Monday morning, August 1st, 1955, Mr. George Chiz and Mr. Jan Jacobus Wolvers were sworn in as citizens of Canada. This Canadian Citizenship Ceremony is always touching and impressive.

Fresh Fruits and Vegetables Satisfy Summer Appetites

Summer is the time when the family is apt to be what the French call "grinchéux", meaning not in very good humour. But to wonder for the mercury soaring so high dulls appetites and nothing seems to taste quite right. This makes summer an extra busy time for the mother because it is up to her to provide the appetite provoking dishes needed to tempt her family.

Actually summer's food treasures are far from limited and many can even be classed as party fare. Tiny chicks hatched in the spring have a special plumpness about them now that makes them a real treat. An abundance of garden fresh vegetables are flooding both grocery stores and vegetable markets now. So this is the time to satisfy those longings for fresh green peas, golden butter beans, snowy white cauliflower, brussels sprouts, broccoli and all the other fresh vegetables now plentiful. Fresh fruit is flavoured and juicy at this time of year. Melons are at their best along with apricots, blackberries, cherries, blueberries, plums and many other fruits.

Although crisp cold foods are often more tempting when the thermometer climbs it is a good idea to serve several hot foods each day. Few people want many hot meals in warm weather but neither do they want completely cold ones. The home economists of the Consumer Section, Canada Department of Agriculture, feel that a hot dish with each meal is not only better for everyone but that it is also more satisfying. For some reason a completely cold dinner often proves disappointing as if there was something missing. HOT DISH SUGGESTIONS

Whether it be a tasty casserole or a hot pie, the day turns out to be it is mother's responsibility to serve tempting foods for the family, without wondering what to cook at the last minute and without cooking herself in the process. From experience she knows that well planned menus and grocery lists will make frequent summer shopping trips for fresh fruits and vegetables less of a chore. She will also find it easier on torrid days to choose simple, easy to prepare dishes that are made ready early in the day while the kitchen is still cool.

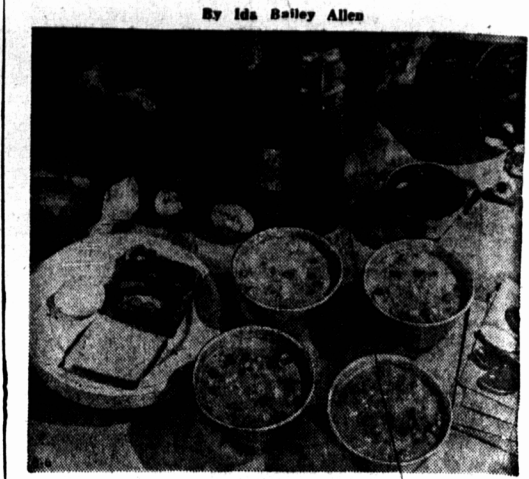

Picnic Breakfast Is Fun And Not Too Much Work



A PICNIC BREAKFAST is nice in summer. Serve hard-cooked eggs, fruit, crisp bacon sandwiches, cafe-au-lait and bowls of hot soup.

"INSTEAD of combating my small youngsters' habit of waking every morning at six, my husband and I try to keep in tune with it," a serene, alert young mother said to me.

"On hot, humid week ends we get up when the children wake, we all have a drink of citrus, pile into the car and are off to the nearest beach for a breakfast picnic. Hardly anyone else is ever there, so we have the ocean and the early sun to ourselves.

PACKS Picnic Basket
"I prepare the food the night before and refrigerate it overnight. It takes only five minutes to pack our picnic basket.

"The menu? Practically a duplicate of what we'd have at the breakfast table at home, but in different form: Hard-cooked eggs, crisp bacon sandwiches, fruit, a thermos of cafe-au-lait and a thermos of hot soup as a warmer-upper.

"Everybody goes in for a short dip, then out again for a picnic breakfast on the beach.

"It's much more pleasant and easy than trying to sleep later on a hot morning, when the children are rarin' to get up and go!"
