Committee has made \$1500 more than last year and that he felt we were having better bands and entertainment this year.

The Barn lost \$8000 last year through operating costs. This years loss should be less due to the new contracts we have with the oil companies.

The Radio Station is budgeted to loose \$4000 and the Sun is budgeted to loose \$7000 this year. Mr. Neville feels that the losses will probably be lower both of these clubs. The Cadre (newspaper) lost \$4800 last year. It was felt that even if the Sun loses this amount or more, it would be worth it due to the improved quality of the paper.

Mr. Neville felt that we are in fairly good financial straits at present, we have paid off \$20,000 of the \$43,000 that we owed the University. The Pig n' Whistles should continue to make a profit as well as the Winter Carnival. Winter Carnival made a profit of \$2,000 last year.

Last years Carnival Committee has returned again this year and it is felt a profit will be made this year as well.

Mike MaMohan, Communication Officer reported that the 1977-78 directory has been published and is available at the Student Union Offices. He thanked Pam

Kennedy, Pat Inghram, Gerald McKenna and Mary Ann Hutchinson for all the time and work they spent on its production.

The student newspaper has changed both its location and name since he became Communication Officer last May. He feels Larry Green has done an excellent job with the newspaper, it is improving week by week.

Maurice Rodgeron has resigned as manager of the Radio Station. Cheryl Cannon is interim manager. Things are running very well at the station. A cable vision camera has been purchased. CIMN is broadcast on Cablevision 12.


Discussion followed the speeches. Some very good points were raised by Emanuel Amohi. Some of these questions were 1. Why was Memorial closed as a residence and what is being done with it, 2. Do we have any student input into administration decisions, 3. Why doesn't Administration subsidize Student Union, 4. and finally, has anything been done about the high cost of textbooks in the bookstore.

Other questions raised by students were 1. What has been done about A.F.S., 2. Is the Student Union doing anything about student employment, and 3. how many student Reps on Senate and Board of

Governors.

This writer feels that it was a very good meeting despite the poor attendance. In fact, one of the best in the last 4 or 5 years. The biggest complaint was the length of the meeting. The amphitheater was booked

from 3-4:05. There was a class scheduled at 4:10. Some good discussion was just getting started when the meeting was called to an end. Hopefully the next meeting will be scheduled so that there will be no restrictions on time.
