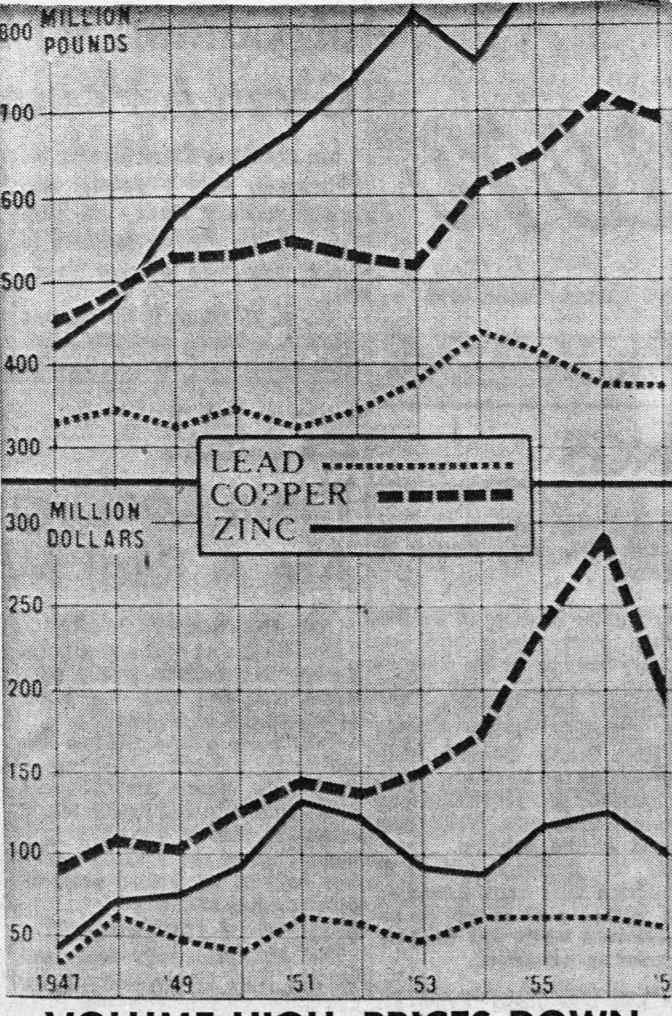

Right-Wing Mosleyites May Be Troublemakers In The U. K.

By KEN METHERAL... Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON (CP) - The extreme right-wing Mosleyites may be re-emerging as troublemakers on the fringe of politics.

The Mosleyites, formerly the British Union of Fascists and now known as the Union Movement, joined forces with Communist demonstrators Monday night to chase Housing Minister Henry Brooke from a platform where he was attempting to explain the government's controversial Rent Act.

The scene was reminiscent of riotous demonstrations in London's East End by the Mosleyites in the pre-war years. Their leader, Sir Oswald Mosley, now lives in France and Ireland but gave his blessing to Monday night's action.

While Brooke was explaining the unpopular bill, shouting men stormed the platform, tipped over the speaker's table and forced Brooke to seek shelter in a room. Police later escorted him from the building.

Before the meeting began, the Mosleyites made their presence known. A group of about 100 men packed into several rows of seats in the 500-seat oblong hall for the meeting organized by a Conservative constituency association.

New Telephone Cable Planned

LONDON (CP) - A new transatlantic telephone cable, expected to meet phone and telegraph requirements between Canada and Europe for 20 years, will be completed by mid-1961, the British Post Office announced Thursday.

It will be a single two-way line using a plastic cable developed by United Kingdom and Canadian scientists. The project will cost \$9,000,000.

The present Atlantic cable, a double cable running in each direction, provides 36 conversation channels. The new one will have 60 channels in the one cable, which has been christened "Canada-Canada Transatlantic Telephone."

This will be a Commonwealth project. The cable, running from the west coast of Scotland to Newfoundland, will be leased to Telecommunications Corporation and Cable and Wireless Limited. The latter will be responsible for its maintenance.
