TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 17.
In the House of Commons to-day, Mr. McMillan, of Huron, moved a resolution proposing that agricultural fertilizers be placed on the free list.
Hon. Mr. Foster replied that, pending the delivery of the budget, it was impossible for the government to discuss the matter.
After discussion the motion was declared lost on division.
Mr. Flynn resumed the debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Eisenhauer, declaring the expediency of raising the bounty now allowed fishermen in proportion to the increased bounty allowed manufacturers of pig iron.
The debate was continued by Messrs. Kenny, Jones and Colby, until six o'clock. After recess the Rykert matter was taken up.
In amendment to Sir Richard Cartwright's motion, Mr. Kirkpatrick moved that the matter be referred to a Committee on Privileges and Elections. This was debated until midnight, when it was unanimously adopted.
Mr. Laurier, who had very strongly objected early in the evening, withdrew his objection in view of the strong contention of the Minister of Justice that Rykert having appealed for it should be given a last chance to make a defence. House adjourned at 12.05.
A Terrible Disaster.
INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., March 17.
In a fire in Bowers & Merrill's bookstore this afternoon, the fire department seemed at a loss to locate the fire, and began pouring water into the building at the front, when the seat of the trouble was in the rear. The fight continued in this way for about two hours, when the entire building except the front wall fell inward. At the time there were a number of firemen on the roof of the building, and they were buried in the debris. Four dead and fifteen injured were taken out, and two more are known to be in the ruins and are supposed to be dead. The loss is over \$165,000.
INDIANAPOLIS, March 17—11 P. M.
At this hour the work of excavating the ruins is still in progress. So far, ten firemen are known to be dead.
