CNR Gives Sept. Report

MONTREAL (CP) — Canadian National Railways Thursday reported operating revenues of the system for September as \$57,841,000. Expenses, taxes and rents

totalled \$57,878,000 leaving a net operating income deficiency of \$38,000 for the month.

Operating revenues for September, 1957, were \$58,458,000 and net operating income deficiency \$5,662,000.

The figures do not include any provision for fixed charges. Operating revenues for this year to Sept. 30 were \$521,928,000, for a deficit of \$17,016,000, compared with \$577,885,000 for the same nine-month period in 1957 for a deficit of \$2,994,000.

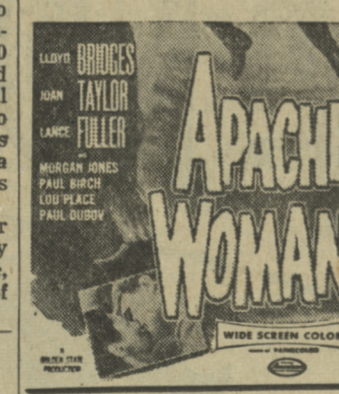
