the Tryon and Mill Valley Woollen Mills, was most attractive and reflected great credit on the proprietors of those excellent factories, whose enterprise is deserving of the patronage of all our people. All the available space in the building was occupied. Competent judges expressed the opinion that the display in the various departments of art and manufacture, as well as in agricultural products, excelled all previous exhibitions in this Province. At the Provincial Exhibition, 1878, held at Summerside, the number of entries of stock, as shown by the chairman's report, was 265; number of entries of articles exhibited at the Summerside Drill Shed, 610. At Queen's County Exhibition, 1879, the number of entries of stock was 282; exhibits at the Drill Shed, 568. The amount of ticket money received at the Summerside Provincial Exhibition, as shown by the auditors' report, was \$293.86; at Queen's County Exhibition, \$310.00,—showing that in the total number of exhibits, as well as in the number of people in attendance Queen's County Exhibition, 1879, compared favorably with the Summerside Provincial Exhibition, 1878.

Annexed is a copy of the Secretary's accounts, which the Chairman duly transmitted to the office of the Provincial Auditor. The Potato Diggers were tested in a conveniently situated field near the city, the property of Malcolm McLeod, Esq., who cheerfully placed it at the disposal of the Board for that purpose. Six machines entered the field, and after a spirited competition witnessed by a large number of farmers, the Judges awarded the prize to Smallwood's machine. The want of a permanent field on which should be erected suitable buildings for all live stock and the proper exhibition of carriages, sleighs, machines, machinery in motion and farm implements of every description, all of which should be under cover, is a great drawback to all classes of exhibitors in those departments. Were it in the power of the Board of Commissioners to offer competitors and stock-raisers food and shelter for their valuable animals and covering for carriages, sleighs, farm implements, and machinery, a large increase in the number of entries as well as other beneficial results would immediately follow. To secure those requisites, an incorporate organization with power to exercise all ordinary corporate privileges is required. An institution of this kind receiving large legislative grants, aided by donations and annual subscriptions from its members, extending all over the Province—would possess, not only the means, but also the elements of power and influence, by which exhibition grounds and buildings could be permanently established; as at Halifax, Toronto, and other parts of N. S., and in all the leading cities and towns of the different provinces of the Dominion. With such spacious grounds and buildings the unseemly haste with which we have to open and close each department of our Exhibitions in one day could be avoided—thereby affording the public more time for the proper inspection of the various exhibits in the agricultural, industrial, and manufacturing departments of our provincial industries. All of which is respectfully submitted.

**The Nihilists.**

The Nihilists have been charged with clumsiness and want of calculation in their attempts on the life of the Czar. It is true that they have been singularly unsuccessful, but this cannot, in any single instance, be traced to any miscalculation. The first attempt at St. Petersburg in 1866 and the second attempt at Paris in 1867, both failed because of the utter recklessness of the assassins, who made their attacks in open day, in the presence of thousands of people. The third attempt last fall in the garden of the Winter Palace failed because of the nervousness at the extreme moment of the perpetrator, and the watchfulness of one of the Czar's body guard. Only by accident, or more correctly through the interference of providence, have the fourth and fifth attempts failed of their object. The mine laid under the railway track near Moscow was exploded at the very moment that the carriage, which was supposed to be that of the Czar, passed over, and the wreck of the train showed how little hope of escape their would have been for the Czar had his train proceeded the baggage train, as was intended, until the last moment before starting. Concerning the attempt of a few days ago, it is said that enough of allowance had not been made for probable delays. It appears from the letter of the Duke of Hesse, who was happy enough to be the unwitting saviour of the Czar's life, that at least half an hour was allowed for detentions by the conspirators. It appears that the Bulgarian difficulty would also have been suddenly and unexpectedly solved had the attempt succeeded, as that rather arbitrarily inclined Prince Alexander would have been among the victims. The Nihilists appear to be not a whit discouraged by their last supreme failure, but announce that they will celebrate the twenty fifth anniversary of the accession of the Czar next Wednesday in a way that will put all attempts at illumination since the time of Nero to shame. The people very naturally believe that they will keep their word, and are accordingly trying to get away from St. Petersburg. Only one man, so far as is known, is anxious to be there, and that man is the future King

of England. It is to be hoped the better judgment of the Queen and the Princess of Wales will prevail, and that he will consent to forego the pleasure, happily so little indulged in by the royal family of England, of risking his life. The Czar appears to be more composed than public reports would indicate, as he has driven since the explosion through the streets in an open sleigh.

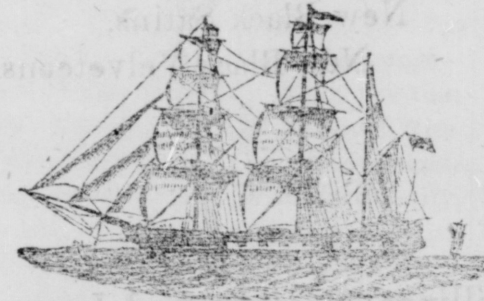

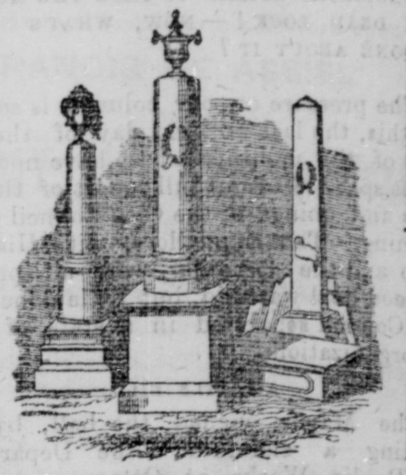
