

MISCELLANEOUS.

In one German city, Breslau, there are 3,000 people who do not receive their correspondence until it has been examined by the police.

Lord and Lady Dufferin arrived in Ireland on October 1st, when they proceeded at once to the Viceregal Lodge on a visit to Lord and Lady Cowper.

A despatch to the Times from Rangoon says:—The reports relative to the Burmese preparations for war are regarded as exaggerated and absurd. No serious trouble is anticipated.

The imports into France for the nine months ending on the 30th of September show an increase of 253,000,000f. as compared with the same period last year. Of this increase 189,000,000f. is in food. The exports during the same period increased 69,000,000f.

A private telegram from Sydney states that great political excitement prevails in Queensland. The mail contract has been suspended. The Ministry is denounced and the opposition is strongly supported.

A Canadian writes to the Toronto Mail that he started for Kansas some time ago, allured by the promises held out. He took up a farm, worked hard all spring and summer, and put in a large area in wheat. When he came to gather his crop he found he had about eight bushels to the acre, insects having got the rest. He gathered his farm stock together, sold the lot and when he squared up preparatory to returning to Canada, he had \$20 in his pocket. This man had a good outfit of agricultural implements when he left Canada, and he gives his experience, which he says should counteract a theus and circulars, as a warning to other Canadians.

Two woolly elephants arrived in New York a few days ago. They are the first of their species ever brought to this country. The larger of the two is less than thirty-six inches high, and the smaller scarcely measures twenty-six inches in height. They are thought to be about six years old. The chief peculiarity of these elephants, apart from their diminutive size, is the fact that they are covered with a thick black wool or hair, especially about the crown of the head, the back and the legs. The wool is two or three inches long. They are denizens of the mountain ranges of Asia, and seldom resist the heat of the lower countries.

Very few of the sudden deaths which are said to arise from diseases of the heart do really arise from that cause. To ascertain the real origin of sudden death, an experiment was tried and reported to a scientific congress at Strasbourg. Sixty-six cases of sudden death were made the subject of thorough examination; in these cases only two were found who died from disease of the heart. Nine out of sixty-six died of apoplexy, while there were forty-six cases of congestion of the lungs—that is, the lungs were so full of blood that they could not work, there not being room enough for a sufficient quantity of air to enter to support life. The causes that produce congestion of the lungs are—cold feet, tight clothing, costive bowels, sitting still until chilled after been warmed with labor or rapid walking, going too suddenly from a close room into the air, especially after speaking, too hastily walking on running to catch a train, &c. These causes of sudden death being known, avoidance of them may serve to lengthen many valuable lives, which would otherwise be lost under the verdict of heart complaint. That disease is supposed to be inevitable and incurable; hence many may not take the pains they would to avoid sudden death, if they knew it lay in their power.

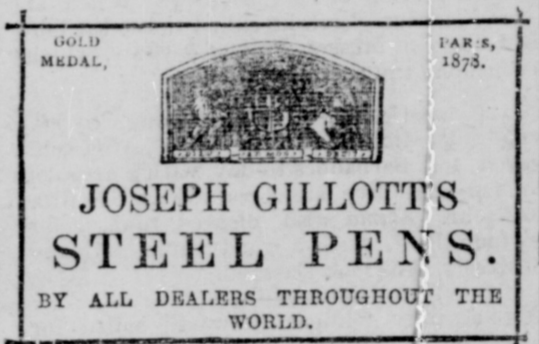
