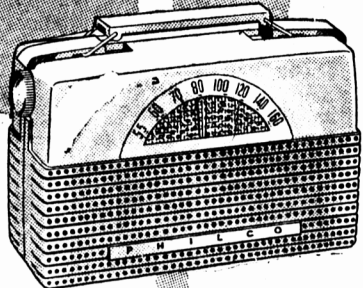


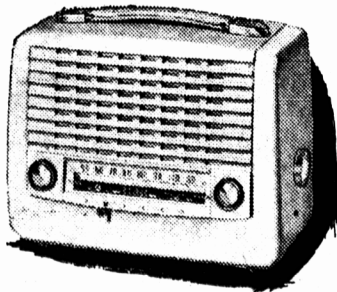


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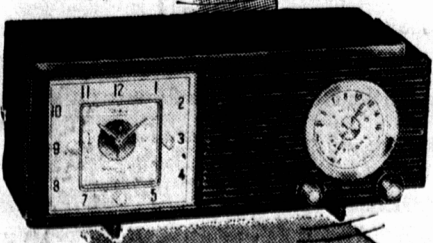
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Kinsmen Hold Kiddies Picnic

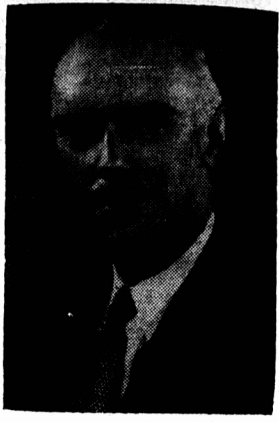

Appointed General Passenger Agent For Atlantic Region CNR



The appointment of George Stiven (above) as general passenger agent for the Atlantic Region of the Canadian National Railways with headquarters at Moncton, N.B., was announced at Montreal yesterday by O. A. Trudeau, general passenger traffic manager of the system. Mr. Stiven, whose appointment is effective August 1, succeeds P. L. Dougan, who is retiring on pension.

Bringing more than 36 years experience in the operating and passenger departments of the railway to his new position, Mr. Stiven, a native of Tillamook, Scotland, joined the Canadian Government Railways at Moncton in 1917 as a clerk. He advanced to secretary to traffic manager of the Atlantic Region at Moncton in 1923, and moved to Montreal in 1928 to become secretary to the general traffic manager and later secretary to the vice-president of traffic.

Mr. Stiven was named chief clerk to the assistant traffic vice-president in 1930. Six years later he moved to Toronto as terminal passenger agent of the C. N. R. and in 1942 to Windsor, Ontario, as city passenger and ticket agent. Mr. Stiven was appointed district passenger agent at Winnipeg in 1952.

Veteran Clansman From New York At Scotch Gathering

One of the distinguished clansmen attending the annual Scottish Gathering at Montague yesterday was Mr. Albert Edward MacKinnon, of New York City.

Mr. MacKinnon, who is quite active at the age of 84 was a former publisher in Michigan with the "New York World" and was born in Boston, Mass. He has always maintained close connections with the Clan all over the world. His newspaper business, on many occasions took him to the continent and during the reign of George VI he represented his paper when a tablet from New York City was presented to Old York in England. The tablet was unveiled by the late King and the address was read by the Archbishop of Canterbury.

In June of this year he was present for the Coronation ceremonies of Queen Elizabeth.

It is thirty years since Mr. MacKinnon visited Prince Edward Island and he has noted many changes. He recalls that at that time, it was against the law for those who owned autos to drive them on the highway. In reminiscing he regretted the passing of the old Market Square, but realized that it had been discarded as a health measure.

Mr. MacKinnon is a double first cousin of Mr. Douglas MacKinnon of Desable, who was probably the oldest member of Clan MacKinnon at the Gathering yesterday. He is eighty-nine and is still
