THE Government's survey of the Egyptian territory wherein petroleum was recently discovered has revealed the fact that the geological formation of the district indicates the existence of a large oil field. The authorities have ordered a number of borings to be immediately made for the purpose of defining the field and have set about developing the yield of the petroleum on the largest possible scale.

THERE were many heavy porkers at the market to-day. The heaviest carcass was that brought into market by Mr. Charles Hardy, of Little York, which tipped the scales at 606 pounds. It was purchased by Mr. Wm. Richards at five cents per pound. D. McMillan, of Brackley Point Road, also had some heavy porkers, two of which weighed 885 pounds and were purchased by Mr. J. P. Tanton at 4 1/2 cents per pound.

THERE is no secret or patent in the production of "Myrtle Navy" tobacco. It could be produced by any manufacturer, but no manufacturer could make it pay at the price, unless he could purchase on a large scale and sell on a large scale. He could not sell below the present price without a loss even if he could purchase at the lowest advantageous terms. To get a large market therefore, without which it would have no inducements to go on, would be the work of many years. That is the reason why Messrs Tuckett & Son have command of the market, and they are wise enough to retain it only by keeping the price down to pan figures.

MR. FRASER STRIKES IT RICH.—"Crow Nest" stock has risen. All gold mining speculators are agog with the "something rich" that Mr. Fraser has struck at Cochrane hill, Guysboro. A few men raised 75 ounces as the result of one month's work. The mine is ten miles from Sherbrooke, on the New Glasgow road, and the district has been worked more or less the last twenty years, but no money was ever made before. R. P. Fraser since boyhood has been sinking money in trying to develop iron, copper, oil, coal and silver, and will now believe that success comes to them who wait. A new gold mine is also being opened at Caledonia Corner, Queen's county. Roderick McLeod, whose reputation it has in the best practical manner in Guysboro, has gone down to take charge. If there is any money in the lead, McLeod will take it out at the smallest cost. Mr. Fraser is said to have been offered \$20,000 for "Crow Nest."—Hullfax Herald.

The estimates for the year ending June 1887, were laid on the table before the House adjourned, by Hon. Mr. McLellan. The total amount dated for the year is \$38,518,058.

The amount asked for is \$8,920,289 less than the totals of 1885. Of this decreased amount \$6,768,965 are in capital amount. The chief increases are interests \$118,636, payments to sinking fund \$504,407, penitentiaries \$28,771, ocean and river service \$77,000, lighthouse and coast \$22,470, fisheries \$53,000, Indians \$170,939, Northwest mounted police \$102,275, post office, \$188,809. The following are the items of interest to P. E. Island: Cape Tormentine Harbor \$130,000, Charlottetown public buildings, \$33,700, Montague public buildings, \$4,800, Summerside public building, \$3,000, Steam between P. E. Island and Mainland, \$10,000, Winter mail service in P. E. Island, \$5,000, Dredging in the Maritime Provinces, \$30,000, telegraph lines between P. E. Island and the Mainland, \$2,000.

BRITISH NEWS

Gladstone Again Ill.

LONDON, March 25. Gladstone has been taken seriously ill. He is confined to his house and his physicians are in constant attendance. He is suffering from chills and diarrhoea, having caught cold yesterday. The Premier's unfortunate illness at this critical juncture is regarded generally as a political misfortune.

LONDON, March 25.—5.30 p. m. Gladstone has decided to have the programme he had marked out for himself in the House of Commons this morning, carried out.

Sir William Harcourt will speak for the Premier, and will make the announcement which Mr. Gladstone had hoped up to the last moment that he would recover in time to make personally.

Harcourt, at the session of the House of Commons this evening, announced that Gladstone would state his Irish policy to the House on April 8.

LONDON, March 25. Brown, the man who threw a piece of paper into the Queen's carriage, has been released by royal command.

"Served Him Right."

TORONTO, March 25. The Ontario Legislature was prorogued this afternoon. The most striking feature of the session was the declaration by the Government and its supporters of their sympathy with the race and revenge agitators in Quebec.

Mr. Blake's crushing defeat has formed the chief topic of conversation here to-day, and the belief is general that his usefulness as a Party Leader has gone never to return.

The general verdict is that it served him right.

The Revolver in Moncton.

MONCTON, March 25. Dan Gillis, a notorious rough, concerned in a shooting affray at Sackville, came to Moncton this morning and demanded liquor from Mr. Belyea, proprietor of Cable Hotel, which was refused. He fired at him with a revolver but missed his mark. He is now in durance vile.
