The grain is inactive. Provisions are dull and lower.

The navigation of the Lachine Canal is closed since Saturday, on account of a leak.

LONDON, June 12.

The Russians began the bombardment of Hutschuck on Monday and continued the entire day. The Turks returned the fire with interest, but the damage done on either side is not known.

The correspondent of the 'Times' at Berlin sends the following:—Orders have been issued by the Russian Government to accelerate as much as possible a levy of 218,000 men. Despite this, the opinion continues to prevail here that Russia wishes to settle with Turkey on the basis of her nominal integrity in Europe, and that some such settlement will be advocated by powerful persons at Constantinople, if the Russians succeed in crossing the Danube and assuming an energetic movement in Bulgaria.

A Bucharest despatch says the delay of Russian troops in crossing the Danube, having a bad effect on the army.

It is reported in London that Schouvaloff repeats his assurance that the Russian Government has no intention to interfere with British interests in the East. But it is beginning to be generally understood that Russia is endeavoring to subsidize the press and that she is evidently preparing the public mind for her forthcoming occupation of Constantinople.

The Turks are rapidly retreating before the Russians in Armenia, and are evidently determined not to risk a general engagement if possible.

The Sofias are again troublesome in Constantinople, and there is much general dissatisfaction. If rigorous measures are resorted to, a popular outbreak is feared.

The Turkish army of the Danube is reported in a bad way for want of organization.

ATHENS, June 12.

The Greek army will be organized with thirty thousand men to constitute the standing force. In 1873 the army was fixed at only 12,970 men.

ANTWERP, June 12.

Antwerp is being put in complete defensive state by the erecting of strategical works on the line of the river Nethe.

LONDON, June 12.

An Erzeroum despatch reports that the Turks assumed the offensive: Muktar Pasha's detachment flying columns is to attack the Russians at Oltu, who retired to Penik.

Grand Duke Michael and his staff are reconnoitering Kars, which still holds out. The town is closely invested and probably an attempt will soon be made to storm it.

The breakage in the Lachine Canal proves to be much more serious than was contemplated. It is expected, however, to be repaired by the morning, and navigation will then be resumed.
