ADB DIRECTOR SPEAKS

Dr. Weeks Gives Reasons For Setting Up Of Board

By JIM CULLEN One of the largest attended meetings of the Charlottetown Board of Trade was held at the Charlottetown Hotel last night. The seven presidents of the individual Island Boards of Trade were present.

A. Walthen Gaudet, president of the Charlottetown Board commenting on attendance stated: "I don't think I have ever seen a meeting of this board so well attended and also I have noticed five or six women present and this is something you don't see very often at a Board meeting." He added he was very pleased to see the ladies attending. Dr. Ernest P. Weeks, director of the Atlantic Development Board, was the guest speaker for the quarterly annual meeting. Charles W. Moffatt, secretary-manager of the Charlottetown Board of Trade, introduced the speaker.

Dr. Weeks is a native Islander born in Mount Stewart and he also lived in Pownal and Murray Harbor, but has spent most of his life elsewhere. His father, Rev. S.E. Weeks, lives in Bedeque while his mother's people, Pooles and Shaws, came from the Montague area.

Previous to his appointment as director of the Atlantic Board he was director of economics for the federal works department and had served with the trade department earlier.

He has also been a member of the federal cabinet in the Privy Council office and was formerly an instructor of economics at Oxford University.

MENTIONS REASONS Dr. Weeks mentioned several reasons for the setting up of the Atlantic Development Board and explained several of the aims and functions of the Board.

The ADB has eleven private members, a \$100 million fund and its staff is based in Ottawa. The Board either recommends action to the federal government involving the use of the fund, or alternatively, recommends action or expenditures by other agencies.

Pleads Not Guilty To Four Charges

GEORGETOWN - Pleas of not guilty were entered on four charges by John Charles Martell of Georgetown before Kings County Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, at Georgetown yesterday. Martell was charged with breaking and entering the home of Quentin Dennis Mossman of Souris and committing therein the offence of assault. A second charge was of causing a disturbance in the dance hall in Georgetown by fighting. A third charge was of assaulting Brian Curley of Georgetown and a fourth charge was of failing to stop when signalled by a police officer. All four charges were adjourned to March 9 to allow the accused to obtain counsel. Deputy Attorney General J. Arthur McGuigan, QC, represented the Crown in all cases before the court. Ernest Owen Roche, Georgetown, was charged with breaking and entering the home of Quentin Mossman of Souris and committing therein the offence of assault. The accused was not represented in court. Everett James William MacLeod of Georgetown pleaded not guilty to a charge of joyriding. The charge arose as a result of an incident involving the Georgetown fire truck. The case was adjourned to March 9 to allow the accused to obtain counsel. Raymond Fletcher MacMaster of Georgetown was remanded in custody to March 2 to appear in Souris on a charge of uttering a forged document. Bail was set at \$2,000 with sureties. The accused also faced five other similar charges. Charged with theft of a quantity of groceries, the property of Walter Boudresault of Georgetown, Clifford MacQuillan of Georgetown, failed to appear in court. The evidence of one crown witness, RCMP Cst. William A. Dewman, was heard in the case of Cyril Philip Jamieson, Surgeon, on a charge of driving while license was suspended. Accused is represented by J.P. Nicholson. The case was adjourned to March 23 to hear further evidence. Walter Joseph MacLean, Georgetown, charged with hit and run, was represented by V.J. Fraser, Souris, and had his case adjourned to Souris on March 2. Jay Joseph Kenny, St. Teresa, charged with impaired driving and represented by Mr. Nicholson, pleaded not guilty and the case was adjourned to March 23 for trial. Joseph Henneberry, Rosemeath, pleaded guilty to impaired driving and was assessed a fine of \$100 and costs. Hugh Edward MacPhee of Peter's Road, charged with driving while his license was suspended, pleaded not guilty and had his case adjourned to March 9. The accused was represented

Howlan Resident Assessed \$75 Fine

SDU Debaters Declared Atlantic Area Winners

St. Dunstan's University debaters have been declared winners of the Atlantic Intercollegiate Debating League by virtue of their three unanimous decisions during 1965-66, it was learned here last night. This marks the ninth time in 17 years that SDU has won its regional championship, an unprecedented achievement which no other university in Canada can match. In addition, St. Dunstan's debaters have captured the national crown on two occasions and have been in the Canadian finals seven other times. SDU debaters David Campbell, a senior commerce student from Saint John, N.B., and Kenneth McInnis, a senior art student from Souris, P.E.I., will represent the local university in the Dominion Championships in Winnipeg on March 3 and 4. **NEW SYSTEM** This year, under a new system of deciding a Canadian winner, the first and second-place teams from each of the three regions will enter the finals. The second-place Atlantic Region team will be decided this weekend in a debate between Dalhousie University and Kings College. Each of the six teams will debate once before the same panel of judges who will declare a winner. The Western Region will be represented by the University of British Columbia and the University of Saskatchewan. The Central Regional representatives are not known. SDU has been drawn to debate against the University of Saskatchewan on the negative side of the topic: Resolved that Canada's role in a troubled world must be the middle road. The SDU team is a unanimous decision over the University of New Brunswick, St. Thomas University and Kings College on their way to winning the title were comprised of the following debaters: Kenneth McInnis and Charles McMillan; David Campbell and Weston McAleer; and Thomas McMillan and Phillip MacDonald. Coach is Rev. Dr. F.W.P. Bolger.
