Fluoridation Bylaw Invalid

TORONTO (CP) — A Metropolitan Toronto by-law ordering fluoridation of the water supply for 13 Toronto-area municipalities has been declared invalid.

The Ontario Court of Appeal Monday threw out the by-law on the grounds that the Metropolitan Toronto Council has no power to authorize fluoridation.

Fred Gardiner, chairman of the council, said an appeal will be

considered at a meeting next Tuesday.

Chief Justice J. W. Pickup and four other judges upheld an appeal by suburban Forest Hills village.

Chief Justice Pickup said he had studied all the provisions regulating water supply and hadn't found anything which gave the metropolitan council the right to authorize fluoridation.

Legal spokesmen said the decision may mean a halt to fluoridation programs in nine other communities with a total population of 200,000.

WEST RIVER
Mr. R. R. Bell asked the Minister of Highways to table answers to the following questions:
(1) What has been the cost of the rights of way north and south of the West River to the proposed site of the West River Bridge?
(2) Has the work of building the new bridge been discontinued? If so, why?
(3) Were complete examinations made of the location picked on? If so, file reports of the results of the examinations.
(4) Were other points on the river examined? If so, give results of said examinations.
(5) What has been the total cost to date?
(6) Have Federal engineers been called in on this project?
(7) What are the plans for completion?

ANSWERS
1. \$200,000 to date. (Estimated total - \$350,000.)
2. Yes. The bridge is being redesigned.
3. Yes. See attached reports of boring crews.
4. Yes. See attached reports of boring crews.
5. \$64,808.43.
6. No.
7. Since causeway plans have

been disallowed at Hillsboro River, a causeway is proposed for West River. (It was not considered sound, from an engineering point of view, to place causeways across all three rivers. Therefore a causeway was not planned for West River originally.)

Young Turkish Cypriots Turn On Greeks

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Hundreds of young Turkish Cypriots stoned and looted Greek Cypriots shops here Tuesday in reprisal for anti-Turkish rioting at the village of Vasilia.

They battled police and troops who tried to intervene and shook off the effects of round after round of tear gas fired at them during a three-hour demonstra-

tion. But they finally needed an appeal of Dr. Fazil Kucuk, leader of the island's Turkish minority, and dispersed.

The fighting centred in Ataturk Square, named after Kamal Ataturk, founder of modern Turkey. The neighborhood is predominantly Turkish.

Despite the fierceness of the attacks, the only known serious casualty was a Greek Cypriot news photographer. He was beaten when he tried to take pictures.

NO ARRESTS

No arrests were reported, although the rioting occurred within

100 yards of police headquarters. One policeman, of Turkish descent was quoted as saying "My wife and child are in Vasilia."

More than 30 persons, including many women and children of Turkish blood, were injured in the anti-Turkish rioting Monday in that village of 1,000 population.

The islanders of Turkish blood are cool to the union-with-Greece movement which has sparked guerrilla warfare against the Britons.

Dr. Kucuk, a 54-year-old physician who heads the Turkish party, warned of possible trouble over the Vasilia rioting.
