Garth Crockett of the Dairy men led all batters with three hits in four trips and two of his base knocks were triples. Len Arsenault and Sam Gregory of the Milkmen had perfect evenings at the plate with each player drawing three walks and getting two hits in five trips.

John MacAuley and John Haughey of the City each batted out two hits in three tries. Haughey's bid for another hit was spoiled by Phil Jardine who raced far back of second to grab a Texas leaguer.

First baseman Alf Coody led the B.Y.C. attack with four hits including a home run, triple and

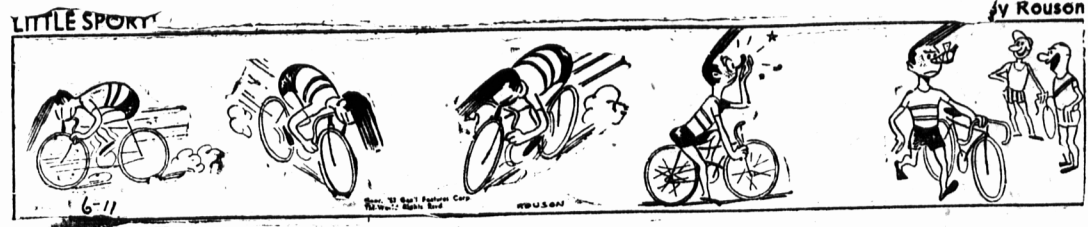
two doubles. Lou Costello of the Bombers had four hits in four trips.

### IN THIS CORNER

The annual meeting of the Islanders Hockey Club will be held tonight at the City Hall and among the most important matters on the agenda will be the selection of a slate of officers and the presentation of the financial statement. President Frank MacDonald has made known his intentions of resigning from the position which he capably filled for the major part of last season. MacDonald stated he would be unable to continue in his present post for another year due to pressure of business. He estimated that he devoted at least four hours every day during the winter towards the Islanders Club and that he often had to return to his office and work late at night in order to keep pace with his business requirements.

The duties of the president of such a club are very onerous ones as are the obligations of every member on the executive. Fortunately the Islanders have always been able to have very capable men at the helm. The first year, the late Major Tom Rogers was the Club President and the following year it was Dr. F. C. Dougan. Dr. Dougan started last season as head of the club and after getting matters organized was forced to resign on account of ill health.

The majority of the members of last year's executive have signified their intentions of resigning. No doubt they will be pressed upon to resume their duties for another year as it is hoped all will descend to oblige. The officers of next year's club, by the way, will be appointed tonight by a nominating committee. That committee will be selected from the floor.

The financial statement may show a deficit of approximately \$1,000 for the year's operations, it was learned here last night from an authority connected with the Club. In consideration with other years this is a good figure. The attendance at home games was about 20,000 below those of the previous year. Club officials estimate that if they had been able to attract these extra 20,000 people in the Forum last year they would have cleared about \$10,000 on the year's operations.

A decision equally important with the financial statement and the election of officers, will concern the future plans of the club. Tonight the members will decide whether or not they intend to continue competing in Maritime Major or Senior hockey. At the moment the picture surrounding Maritime hockey is as obscure as it is at this time every year. However, the guess here is that the Islanders will be ready to compete in full company when next October rolls around.

There is a promising future ahead for young athletes who desire to make a name for themselves in track and field endeavours. Track and field has been one of the forgotten branches of athletic activity during the past few years and as a result Canada has suffered for at the Olympic games. But our week showing has had some beneficial results, among them the setting up of a Canadian Olympic Training Program by the Canadian National Exhibition. This program is being made possible through the generosity of some Toronto sportsmen who donated \$20,000 to promote the revival of track and field.

George Duthie, manager of the C.N.E.'s sports department, was in Halifax yesterday and while there he had a long telephone conversation with Brigadier W. W. Reid, head of the Provincial Department of Physical Fitness. Brigadier Reid learned that each Province will have the opportunity of sending 10 track and field athletes along with their coach on a transportation paid trip to Toronto during the week of the C.N.E. The athletes will attend a four day coaching school and this will be followed by a two-day track meet.

"If we have any athletes who show any promise we will see that he goes to Toronto," stated the Brigadier last night. This is indeed quite an opportunity and challenge to the boys interested in track and field in this Province. Island athletes will have a chance to prove themselves at the track meet here on June 24th and again in the Maritime Invitation Meet on July

# N.H.L. Ends Agreement With C.A.H.A.; New One May Be Negotiated

MONTREAL (CP)—National Hockey League club owners decided Wednesday to terminate the agreement with the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, a far-reaching move which affects all professional leagues and the governing amateur body.

It was understood the decision was taken with the possibility of a new agreement being negotiated. It has been said this is likely to materialize was not indicated.

The notice of termination will be presented to the CAHA before June 30. Under the present agreement, two years must elapse before the termination is effective unless both sides agree to immediate termination.

The decision came at the annual meeting of the NHL, at which owners and governors met separately.

A working agreement between the NHL and the American Hockey League was reached. None has been in effect since the 1944-45 season.

In a draft session, 15 players from the Quebec Senior Hockey League, now the new pro Quebec Hockey League, and one from the Maritime Major circuit were taken up by clubs in the NHL, AHL and the Western Hockey League.

The NHL owners to end the CAHA agreement was reported as a move to protect investments in amateur clubs with a view to more direct financial benefit to these clubs.

In the same connection, the Canadian Press learned that a plan is under consideration whereby a country-wide, post-season series involving sponsored junior amateur teams would be played.

If this comes about, the effect would be sharp curtailment of the Memorial Cup series—for the Canadian junior championship—or perhaps its elimination.

**Criticize Financial Set-Up**  
An authoritative informant said: "The pros are spending lots of money developing amateur clubs and the players. But when playoff time comes, the sponsoring clubs get nowhere financially."

"The CAHA steps in and takes money to operate the CAHA itself and to carry out the playoffs. Last year, the CAHA took from all series—major, senior and junior—around \$133,000. But in the popular Memorial Cup series, each club was allowed about \$325 a game. That's a losing proposition. Yet the CAHA sets itself up a budget to around \$75,000 annually for its own operation."
