# In Memoriam

**J. B. MATTHEW**

At Souris on Friday, August 19th J. Brenton Matthew died at the age of eighty years following a long illness. Mr. Matthew was a life-long resident of Souris, served with faithfulness and distinction in many positions of private and public trust. He was president for many years of the firm of Matthew and McLean Ltd., Souris, and was a member of the school board and town council for extended periods. As the fourth mayor of Souris he capably served for the period of 1916 to 1918.

Most faithful in attendance at the Methodist, and later St. James United Church, Mr. Matthew gave practical proof of his devotion to the church by a keen interest in its missionary enterprises, and by his service as church treasurer for over twenty-five years.

Mr. Matthew was married in 1919 to Ruth C. Crosby of Bonshaw who survives him and who cared for him during his illness of several years. The death in 1945 of their son Jack, who as a lieutenant in the Glasgow Highlanders was killed in action near Wessel, Germany, was a very great shock to them.

A daughter, Miriam of Charlottetown survives, and others who mourn their loss include his sisters, Mrs. F. R. Hertz, Charlottetown and Mrs. Ella J. MacDonald, Souris and a brother, Mr. H. G. Matthew, Souris. A sister, Mrs. (Dr.) J. C. Houston, Charlottetown predeceased him.

The funeral service held on Sunday afternoon was conducted by Rev. H. R. Bell and was largely attended by friends from many parts of the Island. Mr. Leigh Dingwell sang very feelingly "One Sweetly Solemn Thought." The profusion of flowers paid silent tributes of sympathy and respect.

value in directing the affairs of that institution. Many other worthy institutions and causes received his generous support. When St. Dunstan's Cathedral in this city was destroyed by fire, the next morning Mr. Hertz donated the magnificent rebuilding of the edifice. This gift, coming as it did from a non-Catholic, was warmly appreciated by the clergy and laity of the diocese.

The Hertz Memorial Hall, one of the finest edifices of its kind in the Maritime Provinces, was also built by Mr. Hertz and his grandfather and donated to the Methodist (now the United) Church in memory of the late Benjamin Hertz.

**ENTERTAINED WIDELY**

Mr. Hertz did not occupy Government House during his term of office, as this historic building had been handed over to the Federal Government during the War and was still unavailable as a gubernatorial dwelling. He did, however, have his own beautiful residence, "Edgewater," on the Esplanade, which for more than six years was the social centre of the Province, and the scene of many brilliant receptions, dinners, garden parties and other functions. Some of the most eminent statesmen of the British Empire were entertained there by the Governor and Mrs. Hertz, including H. O. Stanley Baldwin, Prime Minister of Great Britain, Lord Peel, Lord Thompson, two Canadian Governors General, Lord Byng and Viscount Willingdon, as well as groups of noted visitors and members of provincial, interprovincial and national conventions.

A graduate of Prince of Wales College, Mr. Hertz always took a keen interest in his Alma Mater, and during his term of office awarded to that institution a substantial annual prize. In six years, \$2,100 was donated to forty-eight young men and women who would otherwise have been unable to continue their studies.

# Death Friday Of Former Dundas Man

The death of Mr. John M. McLure occurred at the Kings County Hospital, Montague, early Friday morning, September 16, after an illness of several months.

He was the son of the late John B. and Sarah McLure, and was born in Wheatley River, on September 27, 1875. With his family he moved to Dundas where he lived for sixty-five years and where he was a successful farmer. Following the death of his wife, the former Margaret Millar, seven years ago, he moved to Montague and made his home with Mr. and Mrs. Frank Greene, Sr. For many years he was a member of the Presbyterian Church at Dundas. His many friends in this vicinity deeply regret to hear of his passing.

The late Mr. McLure is survived by his son, Dr. Millar McLure, English teacher at Victoria College, Toronto, and two sisters Mrs. D. M. MacLeod, Forest Hill, P. E. I., and Mrs. G. A. Hill, Amherst, N. S. Five sisters and one brother predeceased him.

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# To Test Strange Sub For Deep Sea Exploration

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A strange-looking submarine with huge eyes for studying the ocean depths is ready for final dry-land testing.

The 50-ton craft, which the designer says will cruise the sea bottom at depths up to five miles, is to be launched in late October.

Her designer, Edmund Martine, said construction of the stubby craft was begun in 1952. The submarine is 41 feet long, 15 feet high and is expected to have a cruising speed of seven knots submerged and nine on the surface.

He said the craft, named the Cetacean, will be able to sit on the ocean floor for a week, resting on specially designed legs for stability. Her double hull is expected to withstand pressures down to 5 1/2 miles. A 150-horsepower marine engine powers a single propeller. Large batteries supply electric energy to lights which will illuminate the depths of the sea.

A crew of three, says Martine, will operate the craft and the cameras. Most of the photography will be done through special glass ports.

Martine says he hopes first to explore the 2,500-foot deep Mendocino canyon off the California coast before taking the craft to the Bahamas for further explorations.
