U. S.-France Agree On Plan To Halt Reds

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States and France announced agreement late Wednesday on a broad new plan to save Indochina from further Communist conquest. American officials said it called for more than \$700,000,000 annually in U. S. aid. The French agreed they would keep military forces in Southern Viet Nam for the time being with drawing troops from their 10 divisions only gradually — as native forces are built up to fill the gap. The agreement was announced in general terms in a joint communique by France and the United States after three days of conferences here. U. S. officials said representatives of the three Indo-chinese states—Viet Nam, Laos and Cambodia — had been consulted and were "very much pleased".
