

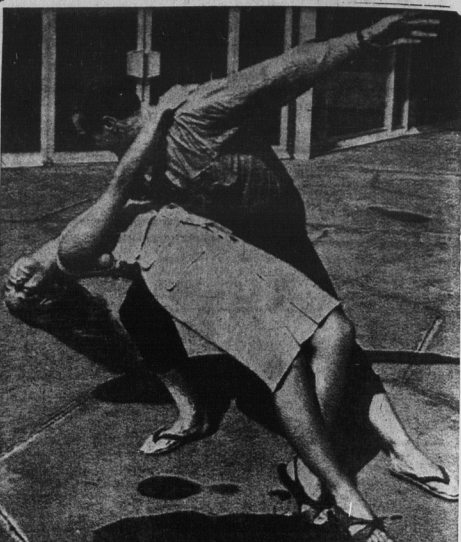
# Alberta's Aquatic Day Will Have Innovations

# Chief Justice To Officiate At Swearing In Ceremony

With Hon. Thane A. Campbell, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island officiating, Lieutenant-Colonel W.J. MacDonald will be sworn into office Thursday afternoon as the new lieutenant-governor of the province.

The ceremony held in historic Confederation Chamber, will be brief, solemn and quiet, and will culminate long behind the scenes work done by the clerk of the executive council, Wendall McKay.

While a select list of dignitaries will be present for the occasion, including members of the new First Family, there will be a small spot of colorful reminiscence for the old soldier taking a new command.

It will come from the uniforms of his recently-named aides de camp. All three of Her Majesty's services will be represented. From the Army will be Lieut. Col. E.G. MacLeod, M.C. ED, and Major R.D. MacGillivray. ED. The senior service will be represented by Lieut. Cmdr. J.H. Hodgson, while from the RCAF will be Flt. Lieut. J.C. Slesniak.

Relinquishing the post he has held since March 31, 1958, will be His Honor Lieutenant-Governor R. Walter Hyndman.

## Wage Violations Are Investigated

Welfare and Labor Minister Henry Wedge said yesterday, infraction of the province's minimum wage law for men are under investigation and are bringing good results.

While Mr. Wedge declined to name the firms involved, he said that his department's inspector had found upon them and adjustments have been made in all cases. About six firms were involved, "some of them fairly large," he said.

He noted that in cases where the 80-cent per hour minimum was being paid, wage adjustments retroactive to when the regulations came into effect in May had to be made.

In other labor matters, Mr. Wedge said the labor relation board has drafted an order setting a minimum wage for female employees in "certain establishments" in the Charlottetown and Summerside areas, and the regulations are expected to go to cabinet soon for consideration.

## NEW FEATURE

## Senate Told of P.E. Aid To Aged Citizens

OTTAWA (Special) — Speaking in support of a motion by Senator David Croft, that a special senate committee be set up to deal with problems relating to older Canadians, Senator Elsie Inman gave the upper chamber a brief resume of what Prince Edward Island is doing for its senior citizens.

She said that in 1962 P.E.I. had set up a Senior Citizens Housing Corporation, a non-profit organization whose object is to provide low rental homes for about 400 senior citizens in the 65 and over age bracket.

She said a couple using the homes, will have well built, well lighted and insulated apartments where they would have independence and privacy. The projects are located in easy reach of churches, stores and medical facilities.

While tenants are expected to supply furniture, heating and hot water will be paid for by the corporation, leaving only a rent and light bills for the tenants. The rent is expected to be about half that charged by private owners and the provincial government was paying 10 per cent of the building cost and central mortgage and housing corporation was loaning 90 per cent.

"The solution of many of this world's problems begins with the individual's acknowledgement of the rights of his relatives, friends and neighbors. We must demonstrate that we realize our responsibilities in this respect, that we care deeply for our aging and elderly citizens," Senator Inman said.

She said the pattern of living for elderly people had changed and the retirement of the grandparents into the chimney corner was over.

Today's homes were not geared to have the older folks living with the younger ones. The yearning for happiness in later years was often frustrated by tension, anxiety and fear, Senator Inman said, pointing out that lengthening the life span meant that more and more people would live past the three score and 10 years. She urged that a set means be found to let older people utilize their talents in a useful manner.

## DENY CHARGE

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Iran has rejected a Soviet charge that it interfered in the Kurdish rebellion in Iraq. The denial came in a memorandum handed to Soviet charge d'affaires Anatoly Anshimov and made public Tuesday. Rejected suggestions that Iran had interfered in the uprising of Kurdish tribes seeking autonomy in Iraq.

# New Borden Ferry Bigger Than Abbie

OTTAWA — Details of the proposed new Prince Edward Island ferry for the Borden-Cape Breton route were released yesterday by Solicitor-General J. Watson MacNaught.

Plans and specifications are being drawn up by G.T.R. Campbell and Company, marine engineers and naval architects of Montreal. Mr. MacNaught said it is expected these plans will be completed before the end of the fiscal year.

The new ferry will be powered by 1,000 horse power diesel-electric motors and there will be four propellers, two forward and two astern.
