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Dead White Bear Stirs Speculation

TORONTO (CP)—Somebody unloaded a dead bear wrapped in a pink blanket near the municipal incinerator or in suburban Scarborough early Monday but police burned the carcass before the animal could be further identified. The law said it wasn't particularly interested in anything but clearing the air. But their matter-of-fact observation that the animal was white stirred curiosity of towns people and the Riverdale zoo. Dr. Norman D. Scollard, the zoo curator, said he'd be willing to bet "100 to 1 that it came from a circus." He said if it was white it could have been either a polar bear or an albino black bear, both extremely rare types around Lake Ontario. The zoo's three bears—Churchill, Frosty and Topsy—were present and accounted for. Dr. Scollard said it was unlikely that the dead animal—it was five feet long and weighed more than 300 pounds—would have been privately owned. There were no reports of bears missing. "All I know is that it was there," commented a perspiring policeman. "And it sure was dead."

General Canvass For The P.E.I. Hospital Opened Last Evening

Last evening an enthusiastic well-attended meeting was held at the Armouries to launch the general canvass in the current drive for funds to provide increased and more efficient facilities for the Prince Edward Island Hospital. Introduced by General Canvass Chairman Bill Reid, Mayor J. D. Stewart, Chairman of the Campaign, addressed the volunteers workers in a few, well-chosen words. Mayor Stewart stated the campaign is presently making satisfactory progress and expressed the feeling that from the air of enthusiasm present there would be no doubt that the general canvass would produce its expected share of the objective. Mr. Donald MacDonald, Campaign Organizer, added a few words to supplement His Worship's remarks and went on to explain to the workers the efficient administrative setup of the Hospital and offered the full assistance of the campaign office to all workers at any time. After thanking the two speakers for their stirring remarks and extending thanks to all volunteer workers for their co-operation, the General Canvass Chairman declared the canvass officially open and divisional commanders and team captains distributed the cards to their team members.

U. S. Steelworkers Strike If No New Contract June 30

NEW YORK (AP)—The powerful wage policy committee of the United Steelworkers of America Monday authorized negotiators to call a strike in the 650,000 man industry unless a contract agreement is reached by June 30. They accused the "big three" steel firms of having offered a five-year contract as a "take-it-or-leave-it" ultimatum and that this constituted a refusal to bargain in good faith. Then members of the 170-man committee headed for home, indicating no early settlement is expected. A new agreement by negotiators would be submitted to the committee for approval. "PURE BUNK" David J. McDonald, union president meanwhile disputed the value of the "big three" steel firms placed on the five-year wage and benefit package they offered the union last Wednesday. The package would amount to a 65-cents-an-hour increase in the fifth year, rising from 17 2/3 cents the first year. "That's pure and unadulterated bunk," McDonald told a press conference. He said union statisticians estimate the fifth year value at 22.2 cents. The wage committee's statement came just a day after the union broke off joint talks with the "big three" in favor of negotiating separately with each of the three firms and eight other major steel companies. BIG FORESTS Australia has an estimated 102,000,000 acres of forested land, but only 55,000,000 acres is considered to be commercial timber. STRIKE OIL IN SAHARA PARIS (Reuters)—French prospectors have struck oil for the second time in the Sahara desert, the French state oil organization announced Monday. The strike was made June 14 in the southern Sahara where the first strike was made last January.
