Farm Experts To Visit Russia

OTTAWA, (CP)—Four Canadian farm experts will get a look next month at what Soviet agricultural science is doing.

Dr. E. S. Hopkins, director of the federal government's experimental farms service, and S. J. Chagnon, vice-chairman of the agricultural prices support board, left by air Wednesday for Moscow to attend the Soviet Union's all-union agricultural exhibition.

In England they will be joined by Dr. W. F. Hanna, chief of the agriculture department's plant pathology division, and Dr. Orlan Hall, assistant veterinary-director general, who are touring Britain. The four will arrive in Moscow for the opening of the exhibition Aug. 1.
