# P.E.I. Cancer Society Opens Fund Campaign

It was announced last evening that during the next two weeks, the Prince Edward Island Division of the Canadian Cancer Society will be conducting its annual campaign for funds, with Wilfred J. Driscoll as chairman for the Charlottetown area. The Summer drive will get underway on about April 15 and will be under the direction of Robert C. Schurman and Mrs. Donald Lidstone.

Asked why the separate campaign, R.M. Jones, president of the local division said that the Society's policy of adhering to an individual campaign was decided upon in June, 1956 at a meeting of the national body. And because of the national regulation, the Island Division of the Society is not a participant in the P.E.I. United Appeal.

The Cancer Society, Mr. Jones stated, is not a continuing agency, like those which make up the bulk of a Community Chest or United Appeal. Rather, a temporary organization facing a disease emergency.

The financial needs of the Society for Research, Education and Welfare, are increasing far more rapidly than the average needs of the community, and therefore require special effort. One of the answers to cancer is found in the support of the public, which, as such, will be disbanded.

Until that time, the Cancer Society is not a participant in all our citizens. Some may give of their time and talents in the making of dresses, some may help in the educational program and all can assist by their contributions at campaign time.

Mr. Jones added that the threefold aims of the Society are: to research, educate and relieve suffering.

# Khrushchev Strains At Chinese Leaders

CP from AP-Reuters KAZINCBARICHA - Soviet Premier Khrushchev, in the first of a series of broadcasts, declared Monday the United States government races over the world's white and Communist China sees possible gain in a war that might wipe out half of mankind.

Discarding a prepared text while addressing workers at a chemical plant in this industrial city of northern Hungary, Khrushchev struck hard at China's leaders who called him the greatest capitalist in history.

By contrast, the Soviet leader noted that the late president Kennedy had said total war in nuclear age makes no sense. Khrushchev added that he thinks President Johnson has ideas similar to his predecessor.

He accused the Chinese leadership of stupidity. As Khrushchev spoke, the Sino-Soviet ideological dispute produced verbal attacks elsewhere.

ACCUSATION MADE - In Moscow, the delegate to a recent Afro-Asian solidarity conference at Algiers, accused the Chinese Communists of propaganda very much like the racist theory that was once carried out in Europe.

The United States is an imperialist country but its government is not imperialist. It is making contracts in the near future in connection with the placing of signs on Berlin Town streets.
