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Representative Of Royal Navy Visits Ch'Town

"Relations between the Royal Navy and the Royal Canadian Navy are always of the closest," said Capt. V. A. Wight-Boycott, R.N., who is in this country as the First Sea Lord's representative from the Royal Navy.

Capt. Wight-Boycott, who has been in Ottawa for the past year, said it was his job to see that relations of the past are maintained in the future. He visited here yesterday and last night addressed the officers of H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte.

He stated he was attempting to familiarize himself with the Royal Canadian Navy throughout the country. He has been in the service 28 years and during that time was awarded both the O. B. MONTREAL, (CP)—Robert Laplante, 37, was sentenced Wednesday to be hanged Jan. 8 for the fatal slaying April 23 of taxi-driver Andre Leon Lorge.

Mr. Justice Wilfrid Lamure pronounced the death sentence after a court of Queen's bench jury had deliberated 24 minutes before finding Laplante guilty.

The 47-year-old Lorge was found in a gutter at the waterfront intersection of McGill and Wellington streets. He had been robbed of \$8.

Also accused in the shooting is 19-year-old Guy Fisetle who will go on trial for murder Monday.
