Exactly \$8,500 is on the line at Hull, Que., where the Canadian Professional Golfers Association tournament gets underway. Prince Edward Islanders in particular and Maritimers in general will be rooting for the Charlottetown pro to come home with a lot of the loot. The opening part of it won't be easy. The best players in Canada will be taking part in the open and Buddy - as he admitted himself before leaving Sunday - will have to be exceedingly sharp over the 72 holes to get anywhere near the top.

Buddy will have as his competition such well known and highly competent fairway artists as Stan Leonard, Al Balding, Les Norman and a host of others. It is undoubtedly the stiffest competition he has ever faced. But local fans who know Buddy realize full well that when the competition is toughest he is at his best. They are hoping that the Leonard and Baldings will put Dowling on to his top performance ever.

STRANGE THINGS are happening in the American and National Leagues.

The Yankees and Braves the two teams almost unanimously expected to repeat as pennant winners are nowhere to be found near the top of the circuits they were supposed to dominate according to just about every prognosticator this spring.

The Yanks started off with a bad slump and have since levelled off but have been playing a brand of ball more indicative of contender than a champion. The Braves are in the midst of the worst slump in years. In fact the last time the defending champs lost seven in a row they were stationed in Boston back in 1953. Fred Haney is worried, although not as much as C. D. Longel whose Bombers seem almost sure now to finish behind either Cleveland or Chicago or both.

Meanwhile the rest of the clubs in the two leagues are reeling, as are most of North America's baseball fans. Even staunch Yankee followers will admit New York's domination of the AL for the past 12 years or so did the league a lot more harm than good, and most while not happy at the prospect - will agree that a new face representing the league in the World Series would be a boost for baseball.

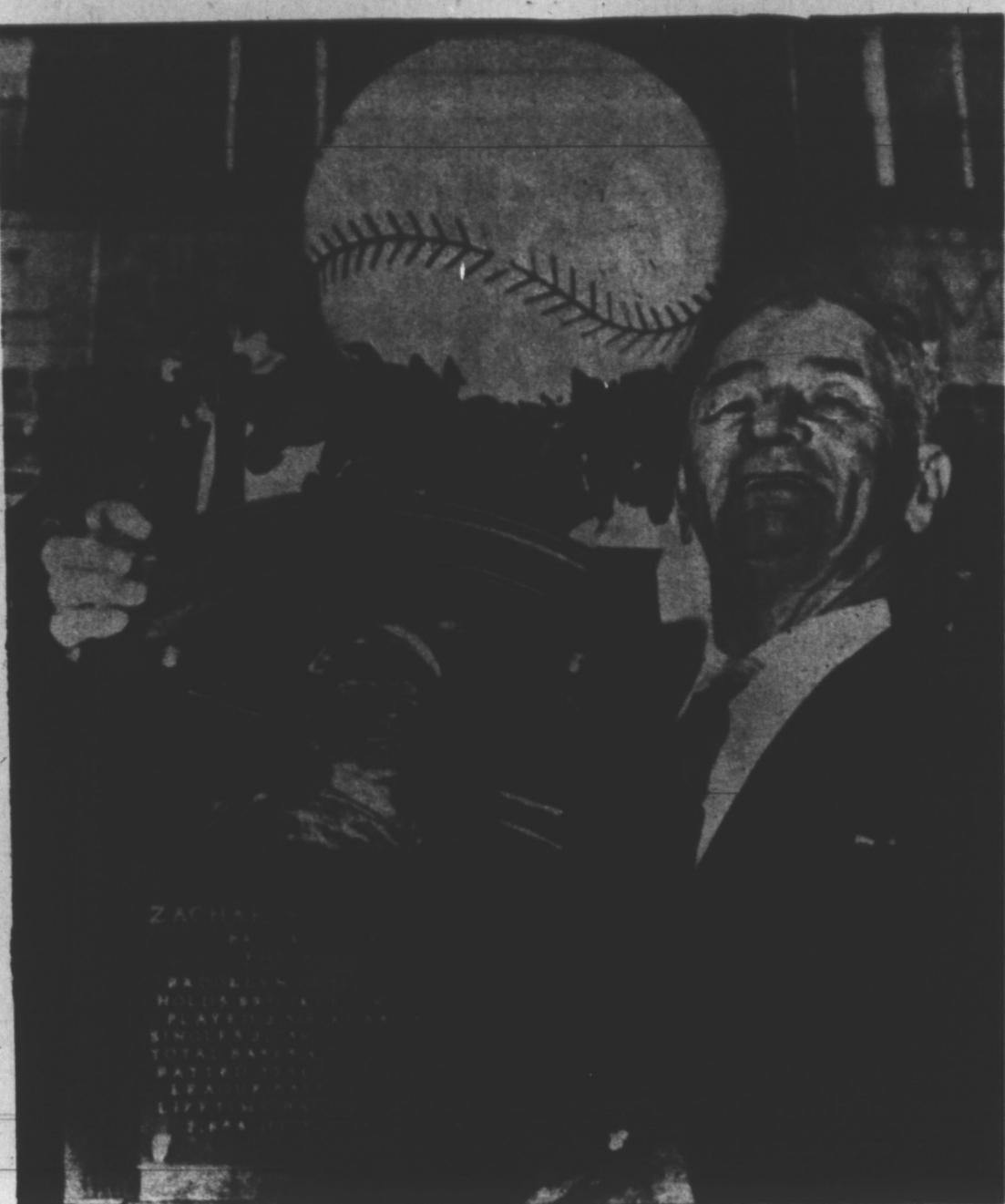
But then, we shouldn't bury the Yankees yet. Always remember the 1958 World Series. If the spirit remains that brought them from certain losers to world champions last year, there could be trouble yet in the American League.

COMMENTING on the strange state of affairs in the baseball world Billy Jurges, new manager of Boston Red Sox, said the other day: "This is a funny game. Not too long ago I was full of baseball entirely. I moved down to Washington and started to mess around with the Little Leagues. I was a manufacturer's representative, and I was far from baseball. All of a sudden everybody wants me. The Cardinals wanted me as a special instructor and Harry Lavagetto got me the Washington job (as coach). They the Milwaukee Braves wanted me and the Cleveland Indians and now Boston. I just can't figure it out."

WHAT ARE Cleveland's chances of going all the way to the AL Pennant? The Tribe's farm director How Evers thinks they are pretty good. Here he is talking about them:

"We've been down so long that I think we have to be taken seriously. Sure we all look for a close race right down to the end. Anyone of five clubs could win it, but I like our chances. One thing I like especially is the young arms of our pitching staff. They should hold us in the hot weather. I'm not so sure about those old fellows who must carry the load for the White Sox, if they are going to make it. It will be a tribute to experience if they stand the strain."

U.S. baseball writers apparently are going along to some extent with Evers. The other day they revised their thinking and made Chicago and Cleveland top bets to grab the pennant. The Yanks they rated third.

Nell's Lad came in first in the first half of this double, but he was barred from the pari-mutuels, so Jean Clegg, who was second combined with Callie Hal.

A win ticket on Helen's Dream paid \$10.70 and a win ticket on Perfect Hal paid \$10.

Kennedy Cops N.B.-P.E.I. Amateur & Open Crowns

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—Bud Kennedy snatched the New Brunswick Prince Edward Island amateur and open golf crowns Wednesday with a 294 total for 72 holes at the Riverside Golf and Country Club.

The Riverside shotmaker carded 73 for his first round Wednesday and then fired a one-under par 70. John Sears of Fredericton also had 70 for the final round and finished as runner-up with 297.

Next in order among the first five were Maurice Dowling of Moncton with 296, Dave Irving, Fredericton, 302, and Bill Davidson, Riverside, 306.

Kennedy and Irving won the remaining berths on the two-province Willingdon Cup team, in previous elimination plays, the other two Willingdon positions went to Dowling and Sears.

Moncton's Jim Walker led the field of 10 professionals by carding 296 and was eclipsed only by Kennedy's 294.

Riverside professional Don Sinclair came in Wednesday with the second best score, knocking off rounds of 81-75-72-301, to give Walker a chase to the final hole.
