Trade Board suggests Information Centre

What will happen to the Father of Confederation Memorial complex once the 1964 Centennial is over? This question was asked Friday at a meeting of the council of the Charlottetown Board of Trade and considerable discussion arose as to what could be done to keep the buildings in full use.

The meeting also went on as commending Mayor A. Wathen Gaudet and the city councillors for the courtesies they extended to visiting convention delegates during the past two weeks.

They noted some comments from the visitors which included "magnificent treatment... extremely generous"... and "no other city has ever treated us so royally or extended such generous welcomes".

It was agreed that the Confederation buildings "offer the finest attractions and convention facilities on the North American continent", but was emphasized that all large conventions had to be "lined up" at least one or two and even three years in advance and so steps must be taken to assure the buildings' use.

The meeting felt that City Hall should be urged to establish a city convention and information centre whose purpose it would be to supply details of the facilities here to organizations planning conventions and to "perpetuate the idea" that will mean so much to the city.

Special note was made of the fact that the business of choosing convention sites was highly competitive and therefore the job of such an information centre would certainly be difficult, but also necessary.

2 Shipyard Buildings Underway At Georgetown

GEORGETOWN — Work on the construction of two large buildings for the Georgetown Limited is progressing favorably and weather has failed to halt operations in the drive for a spring deadline completion.

The framing of the larger 110 foot by 34 foot office building is now completed and the next step is the installation of the windows and then the building will be closed in.

This building has a boiler room measuring 37 by 17 feet. The building will contain a preliminary control room, electrical and secretarial staff rooms. It is located on the north-west part of the adjacent site and runs east and west.

The second and largest building is now under construction in the metal and plate shop which will be of steel frame construction. It measures 220 by 40 feet and will be used for the assembly of sections of the ships under construction and will also ship building to be done inside and on 12 month basis.

permitted a change in the city Act of Incorporation, which allowed the mayor and five councilors to remain in office an extra year, with the other five councilors running an election.

Next year, there will be contests for council seats in Wards 4 and 5, for the mayoralty, and for water commissioners.

The greatest amount of interest appears to have been stirred up in Ward 6, where Edward MacLean has been council representative since the ward, the former Spring Park village, was amalgamated with the city. Some residents have expressed serious dissatisfaction with actions of council, and a movement to get "fresh blood" to represent them appears in the process of organization.

Most prominent of the names mentioned to date is that of Dr. Douglas MacDonald, but it is noted that several others are under pressure to offer, and the possibility exists as many as a dozen candidates may be in the field.

Although rumors have been flying regarding Wards 1, 2 and 3, there is little which can be pinned down as fact. Ward 3 will definitely have a contest, with the recent announcement by Frank Zalem that he would enter the field in opposition to Arthur Wright, present representative of the ward. A lively battle is expected.

No opposition is apparent at all for Mrs. Dorothy Corrigan, Councillor for Ward 2.

Once again, there are only rumors of a contest in Ward 1, where the present Councillor Arthur Gormley is almost a fixture in City Hall after 14 years at the Council Board. Several names have been mentioned as possible candidates with most of the speculation centering around Arthur McInnis, insurance executive. However, as yet he has given no definite indication of his intentions.
