The more experienced and sensible ones among them know that it is a risky and unsatisfying, often a losing game, to hold for higher prices. Besides, it is neither politic nor honest to keep wheat or barley a year, and make the storekeeper whom they may owe, wait that long for his pay. The risks run by holding grain till navigation has closed, of fire, of lightning, of shrinkage, of rats and other vermine, are not justified by the indefinite hope of a higher price.—Monetary Times.
