CLOSING THE STORES.—It is announced that an early closing bill is before the Manitoba Legislature. It provides that any municipal council may, by-law, require that, during the whole or any part of the year, all or any shops within the municipality shall be closed, and remain closed, on any day or days during any time between seven p. m. of any day, and five p. m. of the next day.

INCENDIARISM IN HALIFAX.—John Reyno, recently arrested at Halifax on a charge of setting fire to Lewis' shops, on Water Street, that city, has turned Queen's evidence. As a result of this fire, the insurance companies lost \$3,500 on Lewis' stock. Reyno says he burned the place at the request of John Lewis and his son Samuel. Both Lewis' were accordingly arrested. Reyno's story is that he piled lumps and oilcloths up near the stove at Lewis' suggestion, threw a lighted match into the material and ignited the blaze. When the fire was seen to be spreading, he saw it was necessary to have the alarm sounded, so that the fire department was set up in reaching the scene. Just before the fire Samuel Lewis said to Reyno: "John, it's time to let her go," and the fatal match was dropped. Reyno said no definite bargain was made, but he expected \$100 for setting the place on fire.

Judge Meeson committed the Lewis' father and son, for trial. The insurance people, it is said, proposed to drop proceedings against Reyno, but he was served with a warrant at the instigation of Lewis on his own confession. Lewis is a Hebrew. Several recent Halifax fires have been ascribed to incendiaries.
