

THE TRAITOR LOPEZ.—Col. Miguel Lopez, the traitor, after selling Maximilian and his generals, went to Puebla to visit his wife.—His reception was decidedly cold. His wife advanced to meet him, leading his little son by the hand, and addressed him, thus:—"Sir, here is your son, we cannot split him in two, take him. You are a base coward and traitor. You have betrayed your country and your benefactor. From this hour we are strangers, for I shall this day retire to my family. Go."

Robert Bonner, of the New York Ledger, bought the celebrated trotting horse Dexter, a few days ago, paying for the animal the sum of fifty thousand dollars.

Confirmatory information has reached Washington that the Mexican authorities have turned over Maximilian's body to the Austrian officials at Vera Cruz. The body was in a zinc-lined coffin, and as it has been poorly embalmed, was fast decomposing.

In Nova Scotia the elections for members to serve in the House of Commons and the Local Legislature, will take place on Sept. 18th. Nomination Day will be on the 11th.

The writs for the Ottawa elections in the city and county of St. John, N. B., have been received by Sheriff Harding, who announces that the nomination of candidates will take place on Monday, Sept. 9th. The County Elections come off on Friday, the 13th, and the City Election on Saturday, the 14th, and Monday, the 16th, will be Declaration Day.

With a party of friends, we visited the new light house on the Point, an institution which reflects great credit upon its present efficient keeper, Alexander Beaton, Esq., upon Mr. McDonald who built it, and last, though not least, upon the Hon. Emanuel McEachern, through whose influence and exertions it was erected. A Light House on the East Point was long wanted, especially by the hardy and enterprising fishermen of King's County. On our return, we called at Mr. Angus Beaton's, where a repast that would do honor to a prince awaited us. Next day we drove to the North Side with Messrs. Lauchlan McDonald, Donald Stewart, and other esteemed friends. Here we partook of the generous hospitality of Charles McEachern, Esq., and his respected family. Indeed we received a "Highland welcome" everywhere, for which words fail us to express our gratitude. A visit to the country derives much of its pleasure and satisfaction from the warm-hearted liberality of the people. The greater part of our time at East Point we passed under the hospitable roof of the Hon. Mr. McEachern, whose kind attentions and those of his amiable sisters, we shall never forget. Judged by our experience, the East Point is not only a "place of light" but a land of whole-souled generosity, and kindness as well. Wishing its people a long life of wealth, prosperity and happiness, we look forward to our next trip to that section of the Island with the most joyous anticipations.

News by Telegraph.

ROME, Aug. 20th. The mission of the United States at the Holy See, having been discontinued the American Legation in the city has been closed.

LONDON, Aug. 20th. Lord Monck does not return to England, but will remain one year longer in Canada at the head of the new Government.

LONDON, Aug. 20th. Though it is difficult to obtain very reliable information from Spain, yet it is known that Gen. Prim is still at the head of the insurrection, which has not been quelled. It is reported that General Prim is supplied with funds by prominent bankers in Paris.

SALZBURG, Aug. 20th. The Emperor Napoleon held a long conference with Baron Von Buest, the Prime Minister of Austria.

SALZBURG, Aug. 20, (even.) The private interviews which have taken place between the Emperors of France and Austria, and between Napoleon and Baron Von Buest, have resulted in a good understanding, but no treaty has been signed.

VIENNA, Aug. 20th. All the official journals declare that the peace of Germany is now secured.

LONDON, Aug. 20 (even.) The Imperial Parliament was prorogued to-day. The Queen was not present, but the Speech from the Throne was read by a Royal Commission. The Queen declares that there is no longer any ground for apprehension of war.

The treasonable conspiracy in Ireland has proved futile, and the attempt at revolt has been suppressed almost without bloodshed, by the valor of the troops, the vigilance and activity of the police, and the general loyalty of the people. Law has been preserved without the sacrifice of human life. The speech refers with satisfaction to the new postal treaty made by Her Majesty's Government, and in conclusion congratulates Parliament and the country generally on the completion of Canadian Union; the passage of the Reform Bill, and the adoption of other measures beneficial to the United Kingdom.

FLORENCE, 21st. The prorogation of the Italian parliament took place to-day. Garibaldi has again been obliged to defer his movement on Rome, and the preparations which were being made by the party of action throughout Italy, under the orders of the General, have been suspended.

PARIS, Aug. 21, (even.) The semi-official press of this city declare that the conference of the Emperors at Salzburg, ensures a long term of peace to Europe. Another gathering of European crowned heads is expected to take place here. It is reported that their Majesties Queen Victoria of England, and the Emperor Francis Joseph of Austria, will meet the Emperor Napoleon at Paris in October next.

LONDON, 21st, (even.) It is reported from Madrid, that the revolt in Catalonia has failed, and that the authority of the Government is being rapidly re-established in the insurrectionary districts.

PARIS, Aug. 21.—It is said that one of the results of the Conference which has been held at Salzburg between the Emperors Napoleon and Francis Joseph, is to insist that the South German States shall unite in a Confederation of which Austria is to be the head. It is also stated that an agreement had been arrived at between the two Emperors as to the policy to be hereafter pursued by Austria and France.

VIENNA, August 22.—The Journal in this city, generally acknowledged to be the organ of Prime Minister Baron Von Buest, asserts that a defensive alliance has been formed between Austria and France.

FROM THE STATES.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21. Advice from the Isthmus contain the following:—There were flattering accounts from the Barbaco mines. One hundred and thirty-two pounds of gold had been taken out in three weeks, and forwarded to Europe. American mining in the interior of Canaan had been very successful. A battle had occurred at Rio Hacha between the adherents of Mosquera and Colombian Government, but without result, except the destruction of the town, for neither acknowledge being beat, and each hold their position. About 200 were killed, and wounded.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—The cable between Key West and Havana was successfully spliced on Sunday last, and is working well. The movements of the telegraphic party between here and Key West are unknown.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—The Board of Health met yesterday, when Commissioner Stone reported that infected vessels had been permitted by the Health Officer, Dr. Sunburn, to come up to the city and unload their cargoes, and that in two cases of this kind yellow fever had been imparted to citizens; several cases of cholera have also been reported.
