Rush Beginning At City Post Office. The Charlotteville Post Office is beginning to feel the effects of the Christmas rush and Postmaster J. J. Connolly reports that extra help is now working in all departments to handle the additional volume of mail. Letter carriers will have two helpers on the residential walks when warranted; there will be two deliverers a day until the day after Christmas. The Postmaster states that the American mail has been coming through steadily and should this continue, it will have the effect of preventing a pile-up during the last few days before Christmas. The public have been co-operating by observing the "mail early" advice given by the Post Office Department. As in previous years, additional space is required to handle Christmas mail and again this year the Magdalen Island mail will be taken care of at the Armouries. A special mail car at the railway depot will be provided for the handling of American mail. A room in the basement of the Post Office which is normally used as a cafeteria for the employees in the building will be used for sorting the street collections and the overflow of the drops.

Telephone Union Rejects Interim Wage Increase

Mr. Arthur E. Holland, president of the Telephone Company local of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers commenting last evening on a resolution passed at a meeting of the union held in Charlotteville on Saturday evening said that copies of this resolution had been sent to the Public Utilities Commission and the union will now await the decision of the Commission. The resolution simply stated that: "Local Union 1811 of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers does not accept the five-per-cent increase in wages at this time and would rather wait for the final decision of the Public Utilities Commission in the matter of the wage dispute between the said Local and the Island Telephone Company, Ltd." Mr. Holland stated that recordings had been made of the proceedings during the inquiry and the Commission had indicated that it would be some time about the 1st of the new year before these recordings could be typed out and studied by the members of the Commission. Mr. Holland said that in making their decision not to accept the interim offer, the Union meant no offence to the Commission and fully realized the good intention of the board. He said the Union attended the hearing to support the decision of the Arbitration Board which had already recommended a 7 1/2% increase in wages and a 40-hour week.

Reviews Functional Changes At RCAF Station, Summerside

"Changes have been taking place periodically at the Summerside R.C.A.F. station, and the recent change over to a different form of procedure and training is part of a developed pattern," said Group Captain A. G. Kenyon, Officer Commanding R. C. A. F. Station Summerside in addressing the Charlotteville Rotary Club at the weekly luncheon yesterday. "The change in functions required a change in personnel and since the last of the student navigating officers checked out, the change is more apparent than real," he said. "Where three rows of Dakotas carrying groups of 14, the present Lancasters deal only with groups of four." "The aim of the Air Navigation School," continued Captain Kenyon, "is to develop individual efficiency in lectures and ground practice and conclude with work in the air. Two pupils in each flying crew is regarded as a proper balance for team efficiency when the tactical exercises learned on the ground are being practised in the air." "The R. C. N. personnel from Naval Air Service now on the station are dealing with a support group for air craft carriers," said the speaker, "and we find them a good group to deal with and hope they will stay with us for a long time."

Overall Picture. Captain Kenyon in commenting on the overall picture said that the reduction in personnel amounted to about fifteen per cent, composed almost entirely of young unmarried students. He pointed out that the peace time alterations to buildings and the erection of new ones on the station running into millions of dollars in the past few years, had been completed. The same number of married men on the station as under the former set-up called for a payroll equivalent to that of the past. The speaker was introduced by the chairman, Alistair MacLeod and thanked by co-chairman Fulton Pierce. The sympathy of the club was extended by President Bill Reid to Dr. Giddings on the death of his father. Letters of acknowledgment and appreciation were read from the Red Cross Society, the Free Dispensary and the Playgrounds Commission as a result of the donations sent them following the Rotary Auction. Walter Hyndman was song leader for the Christmas Carols with Randy Manning at the piano. Visiting Rotarian Group Captain A. G. Kenyon of the Summerside Club and other guests were Rev. W. A. Cotton, D.D., Sinclair MacLeod, Inspector Ross Herman, Arthur Caruthers, Stuart Chandler and Paul Hoy.
