

Local and Other Items.

The City Council meets this evening at half past seven o'clock.

Fresh Bolognese Oysters at the "The Confectionary."

The Carrels will meet to-morrow evening. A full attendance requested.

The new Catholic Church at Digby, N. S., will be consecrated on Wednesday. Bishop Cameron will preach.

The smoke and the heat in Toronto on Monday last, scared many of the inhabitants, who feared the end of the world was at hand.

The new Licensing Board held a short session on Saturday afternoon last. Mr. S. W. Crabbe was elected Chairman. No further business was transacted.

The President's inability to perform the duties of his office continues, but no call has yet been made on Vice-President Arthur to supply his lack of service.

St. Joseph's College, Memramook—This well-known institution has entered upon its seventeenth scholastic year. Classes were opened on the 1st inst.

Returns from Ontario state that Westmanor township will lose \$13,000, London \$18,000, and Lebo \$7,000 by the fires caused by the recent lightning. The total loss in the country will run up to \$66,000.

The Charlottetown Engineers Company will meet at Kensington Rifle Range, on Wednesday next (14th), at 1 o'clock p. m., sharp, to fire their Government ammunition. A full attendance is requested in uniform.

The Mail, in its notice of the Toronto Exhibition, says: "Harris is represented by several heads and portraits, showing a master's hand. It is unfortunate that this artist should be lost, not only to Toronto but to Canada, he having left to resume his studies in Europe."

A respectable citizen was assaulted by four roughs last evening, in the suburbs of the city. As the rowdies found out to their discomfort, the person attacked administered a punning, the effects of which two of them will feel for several days at least. It is becoming unsafe for our citizens to venture out after dark. Again, we ask, where is the police?

The North Sydney "Herald" has been handed some specimens of coal taken from a seam discovered by the Rev. Father McPherson, at French Vale, C. B. The indications are most promising, it being alleged that the newly discovered seam is some seven feet in thickness. The quality of the coal is what is called anthracite coal, which is the first of the kind found in Cape Breton.

The commencement of active operations at the Nova Scotia Glass works was delayed for a few days on account of the workmen's tools not having arrived as expected. Specimens of the glass made at the works present a very fine appearance. The New Glasgow "Champion" is informed that the necessary machinery arrived by Wednesday's train and that the factory is now in full blast.

There comes a strange story from the Clyde to the effect that a number of shipbuilders have joined hands for the establishment of a large shipbuilding yard at Havre in France, to profit by the bounty offered by the French Government on iron merchant ships built in that country. They intend to give employment, it is said, in their new enterprise to 3,000 men. A large French iron shipbuilding industry may spring from this attempt.

REGATTA.—At the meeting of the Regatta Club on Saturday evening it was decided to have a Grand Regatta on the Hillsborough on Tuesday, the 11th October. The subscription list is still open and the advertisement will appear in a few days. The committee has decided to invite four-oared amateur crews from Halifax, St. John and Pictou, and from present appearances it will be the best regatta ever held in Charlottetown. All those thinking of taking part may now get their boats ready, and the public generally are called upon to give a helping hand to make it as great a success as possible.—P. McQuaid, Secretary of Committee.

LORD DERBY, speaking, Wednesday, at Southport, Lancashire, referred to the condition of England in connection with the opinion that British agriculture is to be destroyed by American competition and its trade by protective duties. He said he did not agree with these views. England's material prosperity had received a check, but he considered it only such a temporary fluctuation as individuals or nations are subject to. In regard to agriculture he said nature had been against the country, but there was no reason to suppose that its climate had permanently changed, and he believed that the land is likely to be profitable. In regard to trade, he said he looked upon England's position and prospects as favorable. Thirty-five millions of industrious and ingenious people, with unbounded capital and with connections in every part of the globe, are not easily dislodged from the industrial position they have secured.

Stipendiary Magistrate's Court.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning James Downing was fined fifty dollars for violation of Canada Temperance Act. For the same offence, Paul P. Gillis was fined one hundred dollars. A second complaint against Gillis was called and postponed for one week, the necessary witness being absent. A summons is served upon Gillis, requesting him to appear to-morrow for tampering with a witness who was sent to St. Peter's Bay and had to be escorted to this city to-day. This witness has been re-arrested and will appear at court to-morrow. Joseph Cameron, 11 years old, drunk and using violent language against Richard Coady, fined two dollars or 8 days. James McIntyre (Coaly) charged with deserting Barque "Elcho" was discharged, no prosecutor appearing.

Teresa McAttee and John Goodenough, arrested for larceny on premises of Admiral Bayfield and others. McAttee requested two hours to leave the city. If not then among the missing he will adorn our jail for six months. No sufficient evidence appearing against Goodenough he was discharged.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

LONG BRANCH, N. J., Sept. 9. Official Bulletin, 6 p. m.—At the examination of the President at 12 m. to-day his temperature was 98.4; pulse 100; respiration 17. At the evening dressing, 5.30 p. m., temperature 98.8; pulse 11; respiration 18. It is believed, without referring to the records, that this is the first day since the development of traumatic fever that the temperature, pulse and respiration have been so nearly normal and uniform throughout the entire day.

D. W. BESS, F. H. HAMILTON, D. HAYES AGNEW.

The following was sent at ten this evening:—

To Mr. IOWELL, Minister, London: Medical reports are all favorable to day—morning, noon and night. The President has not, for many weeks, done so well for so many consecutive hours; he has had very little fever. Respiration has been normal and his pulse has not exceeded 100. He slept without opiate and gained strength without a stimulant. His nights are not so restless as could be desired, but in 24 hours he gets sufficient sleep. The weather, though not excessively warm, continues sultry and oppressive. Much is hoped from the clearing, bracing air which may be expected here at this season.

BLAISE, Secretary. LOUISVILLE, Ky., Sept. 9.

A passenger train was wrecked near the anchorage, last evening, by collision with a cow. Seven persons were killed and nearly all others on the train more or less injured.

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 9. The stories of suffering caused by bush fires in Northern Michigan are heartrending. Many entire families have been swept away. The total deaths will reach 300.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Sept. 9.

A Dublin despatch says relative to the reported attempt to blow up the magazine at Castlebar, neither fuse nor dynamite were found, and it is supposed the object was to raise a false alarm.

It is stated that Father Sherry is ill, and that about one-fourth the imprisoned suspects are in the infirmary.

The Standard's Omagh despatch says formal protest has been lodged in behalf of Col. Stuart Knox, Conservative candidate in parliamentary election in county Tyrone, declaring the ballot paper in boxes did not correspond with the return of the presiding officer.

LONDON, Sept. 9.

There is a proposal to appoint Mr. Goldwin Smith master of University College, Oxford, in succession to the Rev. Dr. Bradley, Dean designate of Westminster.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

CAIRO, Sept. 9.

Four thousand soldiers, with 30 pieces of artillery, have surrounded the Khedive's residence. They ask for the assembling of notables and the dismissal of all the Khedive's ministers. The troops also demanded the constitution and an increase of the arms. The Khedive finally agreed to their demands, when the soldiers withdrew with cheers.

TUNIS, Sept. 9.

It is reported that a severe engagement took place on Wednesday, between the French troops occupying Hammamet and Arabs, during which the town of Hammamet was entirely destroyed. No details are reported. The French occupied Vusa on Wednesday.

DANTZIC, Sept. 9.

The Emperor William has arrived. The meeting of Emperors afterwards took place amid great acclamation. The meeting was very affectionate.

GENEVA, Sept. 9.

The village of Reichenboch, Bernese Oberland, has been almost destroyed by a fall of stone.

BERLIN, Sept. 9.

The "North German Gazette" says that the Government intend to re-establish a Prussian legation at the Vatican.

PARIS, Sept. 9.

The Government has decided to distribute 500,000 francs among the Algerians threatened with famine, owing to drought.

INDIANS IN PANAMA.

PANAMA, Aug. 31, via NEW YORK, Sept. 9. The Indians have again revolted and have committed numerous murders and depredations. They number 10,000 warriors. On Aug. 5th the capital of Matagalpa was besieged by Indians who were finally routed with a loss of 500 killed and wounded.
