LATEST WAR NEWS.

Russia Aiding Turkey.

78,000 Troops in Asia Minor

Independent Action of the Porte.

Special to the Examiner.

LONDON, Aug. 18.

The full complement of men required for the British expedition to Egypt is now on ship-board, and starts this morning for the seat of war.

The fleet has been ordered to Aboukir, and the troops are to follow in transport vessels, several of which are now lying in the Suez Canal in complete readiness for the movement.

A Paris cable despatch received here says that it is no secret that Russia is quietly concentrating an army in the Caucasus. It already numbers seventy-eight thousand troops. The report has caused some uneasiness here, and has given rise to questions on the subject. Russia officially denies any significance being attributed to the movements, and denies the substantial correctness of the reports.

The Sultan is still vacillating on the full declaration of Arabi as a rebel.

Reports have come in declaring that the Porte intend sending a large Turkish army to Egypt to act independently and to check the British occupation. This is strengthened by the fact that nearly all the British troops in Egypt are being embarked in all haste, and that the attack will be made from the sea.

Lord Dufferin has informed the Home Office of the vacillating action and duplicity of the Porte, and further informs the Government that Russia has notified her intention of supporting Turkey's independent attitude in Egypt.

Four-fold Murder in Ireland.

DUBLIN, Aug. 18.

A man named Joyce, his wife, his mother, and his daughter, were murdered by suffocation. Joyce was a spotted man, having given information of the murder of two bailiffs who had been thrown in Lough Mask.

British Parliament Adjourned.

Small-pox in Capetown.

LONDON, Aug. 18.

The British Parliament adjourned today until October.

Small-pox is spreading rapidly among the inhabitants of Cape Town, South Africa.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

SUEZ, Aug. 17.

An order has been issued from military headquarters to suspend unloading of transport ships at this point. This has given rise to the opinion that the landing will not take place until the arrival of the troopship Himalaya.

LONDON, Aug. 17.

A Central News Alexandria despatch reports that negotiations are proceeding for the surrender at Meke of 2,000 Bedouins now with Arabi. Another report states it is believed that Wolsey will make an attack, possibly on Saturday morning, in two columns. One along the route of last reconnaissance and the other by way of lake Aboukir, taking Arabi at a point where his right rear rests on Mahmoudieh Canal.

The Daily News says that if Judge Lawson had had the courage and the prudence to dismiss Gray's case with a few words of contemptuous tolerance it would have been better for the ends of justice and the peace of Ireland. Other London papers approve of the sentence.

The Bank of England has advanced its rate of discount to four per cent.

ATHENS, Aug. 17.

There has been a concentration of Turkish and Greek troops on the frontier of Thessaly. The Greeks took up two strong positions near the border as settled by the commission, whereupon the Turks concentrated on the other side apparently to attack the Greek troops. Explanations ensued. The Turks abandoned their threatening attitude and a conflict was avoided.

PARIS, Aug. 17.

The Queen of Madagascar is about to send an embassy here in the hope of effecting a amicable settlement of the difficulty caused by her prohibition of sale of land to French colonists.

VIENNA, Aug. 17.

A great burglary has been committed at the palace of Count Andrássy. All accounts, orders and numerous objects of art and antiquity were purloined.
