The administration of the library is under a committee composed of representatives of the surrounding districts, and the librarian is Mrs. Maurice Cudmore.

In Crapaud a public library was first organized about 17 years ago and for most of that time, until the new building was constructed was located on the second floor of a large general store operated by Mr. B.C. Wood, who generously donated the room without rental cost of any kind.
