A.I. CALVES
 The Junior Heifer Calf Classes at Alberton Exhibition held last week proved to be very large and interesting.

In the Holstein Junior Heifer Calf Class 24 animals were shown. Immediately following the judging of this section the artificially bred calves were judged. A total of 20 calves out of the 24 were artificially bred. Topping the list of this class the first two were daughters of Bechaven Rag Apple Benefactor. Others placing were daughters of Springfarm Supreme Exhibit, Harmon Rest, Gay Boy and several other sires which are maintained at the Unit.

HARVEST EXHIBITION

Another September will soon be here, and with it comes the Provincial Harvest Exhibition. This year the exhibition is on Thursday, September 24, and Friday, September 25th at the Provincial Exhibition Grounds and it again will be held in conjunction with the Rural Youth Fair. As in past years, there are classes for Vegetables, Fruit, Seed and Table potatoes, Field Crop Seeds, Field Roots, Hay and Silage.

This year a change has been made in the prize list. For the first time vegetables are divided into two classes—one for market gardeners, and one for home gardens.

The entries at last year's exhibition were down slightly, but the quality was up. It is hoped that this year's Harvest Exhibition will be bigger and better than ever.

VIBRIOSIS IN CATTLE

When Vibriosis, a venereal disease in cattle, infects a herd, the breeding programme may be set back six months or more, according to veterinary authorities. Repeat breeding, with many infected females returning to heat twenty-seven or more days after service, is a common sign of the disease in cows.

The purchase of adult cows or bulls is a potential hazard in regard to the possible introduction of Vibriosis into a herd, warns the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association. Sexually mature animals appear to develop resistance to infection by this disease causing organism.

Mature animals which are introduced from outside herds should not be allowed to mate naturally in the herd unless a Veterinarian has examined them for venereal infection. If semen is used from carrier bulls or those of unknown fibro status, it should be treated with antibiotics under veterinary supervision, the Association said.

GUT EDEMA IN SWINE

Gut edema in young swine is becoming a very serious problem. Usually it affects young swine between the ages of nine and fourteen weeks. The disease is characterized by its sudden onset in co-ordinator and edematous swellings of various tissues.

LUNGWORM IN CATTLE

In control of cattle lungworm pasture rotation is emphasized.

A well drained pasture containing lungworm larvae will not be infective when such pastures are rested for a six week period.

Lungworm infestation in dairy calves result directly from maintaining such animals under poor sanitary conditions. Calves segregated into the various age groups and moved from group to group as they grow older helps reduce chances of accidental larvae infection.

CONTROL MASTITIS

Failure of the new drug treatments, widely distributed to farmers through various channels, to control mastitis is well recognized.

Treatment can be effective only if it is accompanied by a sound control program. This program should stress the sanitation, adequate housing facilities, and proper methods of milking.
