**LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.**

**POLICE COURT.**—This morning Henry Welsh, an old offender, was fined \$20 or 90 days for drunkenness.

**THE STORES WILL CLOSE.**—All the principal merchants of Charlottetown have agreed to close their stores on the afternoon of Labor Day.

**SHAW'S HOTEL, Brackley Beach,** will close for this season on Tuesday, September 7th.

**ST. PETER'S SCHOOL.**—St. Peter's School reopens Sept. 7th. Fees for girls \$15 per annum; boys \$24 per annum. The schools have been enlarged and remodelled. For further particulars apply to the Rev. James Simpson.

**"THE PRESBYTER."**—We are in receipt of the second number of "The Presbyter" published in Toronto and Montreal at one dollar a year. The Presbyter is a well written and newsy journal devoted to the interests of the Presbyterian Church of Canada.

**BAD CONDUCT.**—A number of men last night disturbed the slumbers of the residents of lower Great George Street by their bad conduct. They talked loud and long, and their conversation was not remarkable for its purity of thought or elegance of diction. The police should treat such characters as they deserve.

**THE PACING RECORD.**—An exchange points out that the achievement of Star Pointer, who has brought the pacing record within two minutes, is not a cause of astonishment. The events of the last two seasons foreshadowed this final triumph. Two other pacers have come very close to two minutes, each making the third and last quarter at a two minute gait. It will, therefore, be no surprising thing if one of the other pacers should match the performance of Star Pointer before the season ends. Meanwhile the two minute trotter is not yet visible.

**THEY'RE NOT WARLIKE.**—The Women's Christian Temperance Union object to war or preparations for war. A despatch from Lincoln, Nebraska, says: The leaders of the Women's Christian Temperance Union in Nebraska have determined to have arms taken from the State public schools. They declare the young men should be taught the arts of peace, not the tactics of war. One woman wishes to substitute broom sticks for guns if the school directors think the drill is helpful in a physical way. The high school boys of Lincoln, Omaha, Beatrice and other large cities now have cadet companies, drilled by a lieutenant of the regular army. The cadets are very proficient, and in an emergency might do excellent military duty.

**ST. JOSEPH'S CONVENT.**—The schools of St. Joseph's Convent will re-open on Tuesday next, after the midsummer holidays. During the holidays the class-rooms have been re-arranged, and new desks, maps, etc., have been put in and other improvements made. There are six class-rooms in all, five for girls and one for boys. They are all commodious and well ventilated, and there is a system of waterworks in connection. The class-room for boys is on the ground floor, and will be under the immediate direction of the Superior. Boys ranging in age from five to eleven years will be admitted as pupils. It is expected that there will be from forty to fifty boys in this class. The fee is \$10 per annum, payable in monthly instalments of \$1. The Sisters of St. Joseph's Convent have an excellent reputation as teachers of girls, and now that their usefulness in this respect is to be extended to boys, a larger measure of success must attend their efforts. Persons having boys of the ages received at the Convent should communicate with the Superior at once.
