7 Canadians Win Big Money In Sweepstakes

Seven Canadians won nearly \$500,000 in the Irish hospital sweepstakes Saturday when Royal Tan, Tudor Line and Irish Lizard finished in that order in the Grand National sweepstakes at Aintree, England.

There were two top-money winners, whose tickets on Royal Tan were drawn, and both live in British Columbia. Mrs. Dora Gato, a housewife of Pleasantville, and Dan Wood, a miner of Britannia Beach, will collect \$140,000 each.

Two lucky Ontario residents, LuLu Mullin, a nurse in Kingston, and Steve Mychylko of Toronto, a former prisoner of war of the Germans, held tickets on Tudor Line and will be richer by \$56,000 each.

A third British Columbia resident, not quite so lucky as the other west coast winners, will collect \$28,000. He is Alex McDonald, an Ocean Falls machine operator, whose ticket on Irish Lizard was drawn.

Two others, who also will receive \$28,000 each, held lucky tickets on Irish Lizard. They are Victor Reynolds, a Foam Lake, Sask., farmer, and Tony Onorato, an apartment-block owner in Preston, Ont., who promptly said he would throw a party for the whole town of 8,500.

Other winners In addition to the big-money prizes, an unknown number of persons will collect \$2,500 each for tickets on starters and \$1,554 for tickets on non-starters.

Another pot of \$80,000 goes to three lucky holders of tickets in the Quebec army and navy sweepstakes. Margaret Zopf of Winnipeg, whose ticket on Royal Tan was drawn, will get \$40,000. Tudor Line's second-place finish was won by Ernest Labreque of Quebec. L. Murphy of the town of Mount Royal, part of greater Montreal, will collect \$16,000 for his ticket on Irish Lizard.

When Mrs. Cato, who used the nom de plume "My Hero," learned she comes in for \$140,000, she said she "just went crazy."

"I don't know what to do. It can't be me. I'm too happy to cry. They say life begins at 40. But I'm 52 and my life is going to begin now."

Miss Mullin, middle-aged nurse at Hotel Dieu hospital in Kingston, said she bought the ticket Dec. 13 and felt she would be lucky because the date was the 13th. It was her first sweepstakes ticket and she refused to sell part of it before the race. She was so confident she would win she didn't bother listening to the broadcast of the race. But when she was told, while on duty, she had won \$56,000, all she could say was, "Oh, my goodness."

Dome Mines Show Boost In Earnings

TORONTO, (CP) — Dome Mines and its two associated gold producers, Sigma Mines Quebec and Campbell Red Lake, all showed higher earnings in 1953, their annual report says.

Dome's net profit was \$1,668,906, compared with \$1,461,165 in 1952, equal to 86 cents and 75 cents a share respectively. Sigma's earnings were reported at \$484,757 or 48 cents a share, against \$400,224 or 40 cents a share in 1952. Campbell reported net profit of \$1,008,704 or 25 cents a share, versus \$723,524 or 16 cents a share the previous year.

The Dome report showed current assets of slightly more than \$4,000,000 plus investments in subsidiaries of \$5,800,000 and other investments of \$1,300,000. Current liabilities were \$927,650.

Sigma showed current assets of \$1,777,808, against current liabilities of \$472,297. Campbell Red Lake, \$1,270,000 against \$630,705.

Dome production totalled 169,743 ounces for a billion value of \$5,860,000. Cost-aid was \$610,000 and after provisions for depreciation, outside exploration and provincial taxes, the company had an operating profit of \$930,000.

Dividends received totalled \$694,977, including \$589,980 from subsidiaries; interest received totalled \$308,549, including \$146,816 from a subsidiary, while provision for income taxes was \$1,833,906.

Dividends for 1953 were \$261,800, against \$344,000 the year previous and from Campbell Red Lake \$339,786.
