However, offsetting this, in his view, is the need for quick action to forestall further historic rights plus the fact that the unanimous approval of parliament for the 12 mile limit will strengthen Canada's hand in dealing with those matters which have treaty and historic rights.

Adventurer, Traveller Returns to Native Island

Making his second visit to the Island in some 57 years P.V. (Pat) Croken of Grand Prairie, Alberta, and a native of Emerald, P.E.I. arrived in Charlottetown recently following a number of years in which he has covered a wide area of the globe.

He first left Prince Edward Island in 1906 when he was one of the then popular harvest excursions to the west. With the harvest over he joined the Grand Trunk Pacific on a telegraph line construction gang, and eventually became construction foreman.

He landed in Grand Prairie in 1917 when the population was a mere 200, and promptly engaged in a general store, between that date and 1957 he saw the population expand to several thousand persons.

Mr. Croken relinquished the general store business in order to devote more of his time and energies to the hotel operation. He is connected with a number of hotels in Alberta, first serving on the staff of the Park Hotel, in Grand Prairie.

During the past four or five years, Mr. Croken has made a number of extended trips overseas. The first took him to China, Japan, India and Ceylon. The second found him rambling through the jungles of Malaya.

Mr. Croken is visiting his sister, Mrs. Milton Cannon, of Charlottetown, and her family. He also plans to spend some time with his nephew, Rev. J. H. Croken, parish priest, of Springfield, and Rev. Harold Croken, pastor of the Anglican church in his nephew, Allison Croken and his family of Charlottetown.

His last visit to his native province was Aug. 1957, and at that time it was his first trip of some 50 years. As long as he is able to travel, Mr. Croken said he intends to visit his homeland more frequently in the future.

Fed. Provincial Relations To Be Discussed

A meeting of Canadian premiers scheduled for Sept. 1 and 2, to commemorate the Charlottetown meeting in 1864 of the Fathers of Confederation, will be given over to a business session dealing with federal-provincial relations, Premier Walter Watson announced yesterday.

All of Canada's premiers are expected to attend the get-together, including Prime Minister Pearson who, as the premier, "has suggested that time be taken to discuss a number of matters affecting all the provinces."

Mr. Watson said the federal government and the provinces are concerned with the continuing delay in the making of decisions and the lack of agency powers the government apparently attaches to the problems of the potato industry.

Mr. Devar said the two questions agreed on unanimously were "are you in favor of a potato board made up of bona fide potato producers to operate under the Marketing Act of 1956, and are you in favor of a marketing board operating an agency to control the sale of seed potatoes and off-grow potato sales?"

Crop Insurance Is Doubled Over Last Year

Crop Insurance sales to potato and grain growers in the province this season are more than double the sales of last year, provincial crop insurance agency manager John Drake said yesterday.

Mr. Drake said sales started off slowly in late May but as deadline neared picked up considerably. Cost of insurance is 50 cents per acre for grain and 5.00 per acre for potatoes.

Mr. Drake said he will carry out his inspection during the summer of all insured crops. A meeting of representatives of Canadian Labor Congress affiliated unions from across the province gave a brilliant light last night by an overwhelming majority on a ballot vote to the formation of a provincial Federation of Labor.

The meeting was convened in Charlottetown at the District Labor Council and was chaired by its president, A. MacLean.

Henry Harm, regional director of organization for the C.I.C.O. explained the structure and duties of a Federation. Several questions were answered by Mr. Harm during the discussion period. He also conducted the election of pro tem officers who are to serve until the founding convention which, it is expected, will be held in September.

The following were elected pro tem officers: J.M. McAlduff, Charlottetown; vice-president for Prince, Lorne Smith; vice-president for Queens, A. MacLean; vice-president for Kines, Joyce MacLellan; secretary, treasurer, Hector MacDougal, Charlottetown.

Secretary of the Federation of Agriculture Lincoln Devar said yesterday the federation committee promoting a plebiscite on the potato industry was not concerned about the question of how the selling agency would operate in the province.
