OTTAWA (CP)—The week of Oct. 7-13 was proclaimed Saturday as fire prevention week in Canada. The notice, published in the Canada Gazette, said that in the last 10 years 4,856 persons died in 623,223 fires which caused property damage estimated at \$800,000,000.

New Study Reveals Why Boys Are Not Dilinquents

DETROIT (AP) — A factor which "insulates" a boy against delinquency has been discovered, an Ohio State University research team believes.

The factor: "A young teenager's belief in himself as a 'good boy'."

The findings of a year-long study were reported Friday before the criminology section of the American Sociological Society at its annual meeting here.

The Ohio State study was based on 126 sixth-grade boys who were selected by school teachers as neither delinquent nor expected to become so even though they live in the highest delinquency area of Columbus.

Reported Dr. Walter G. Reckless, professor of social administration:

"We felt that if we could determine what makes a good boy tick, then perhaps we might be able to get somewhere with delinquency prevention."

Earlier research in the field, he noted, has dealt chiefly with the traits and background of "bad" boys.

A series of self-evaluation tests given to the selected 12-year-olds and interviews with their mothers indicated by the research team that the boys regarded themselves as law-abiding and obedient.

The boys' answers also showed they considered themselves as stricter about right and wrong than most people, "that they attempted to keep out of trouble at all costs and . . . tried to conform to the expectations of their parents, teachers and others."

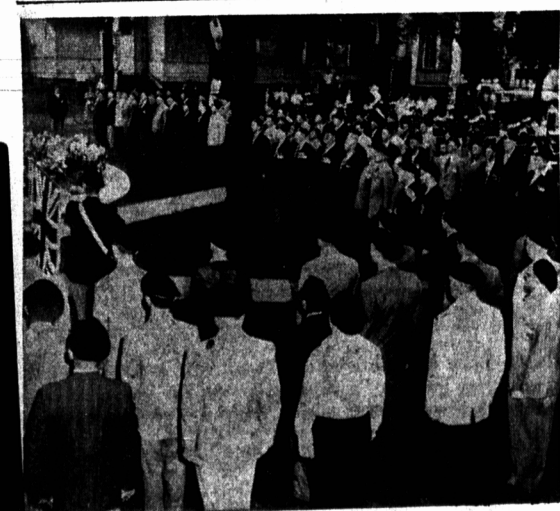
IMPORTANT ATTITUDES

The researchers said the adoption of such attitudes is important in the "insulation" of the boys.

But, they conceded, they have not yet discovered how a boy in a high-delinquency area develops the attitudes which provide the insulation.

They believe the attitudes may be acquired from persons important in the boys' lives, such as a mother, a relative, a priest, a settlement house worker or a teacher.

The researchers also found the "good boy" self concept is more common among youths whose parents have a stable marriage, a permanent home and steady employment.

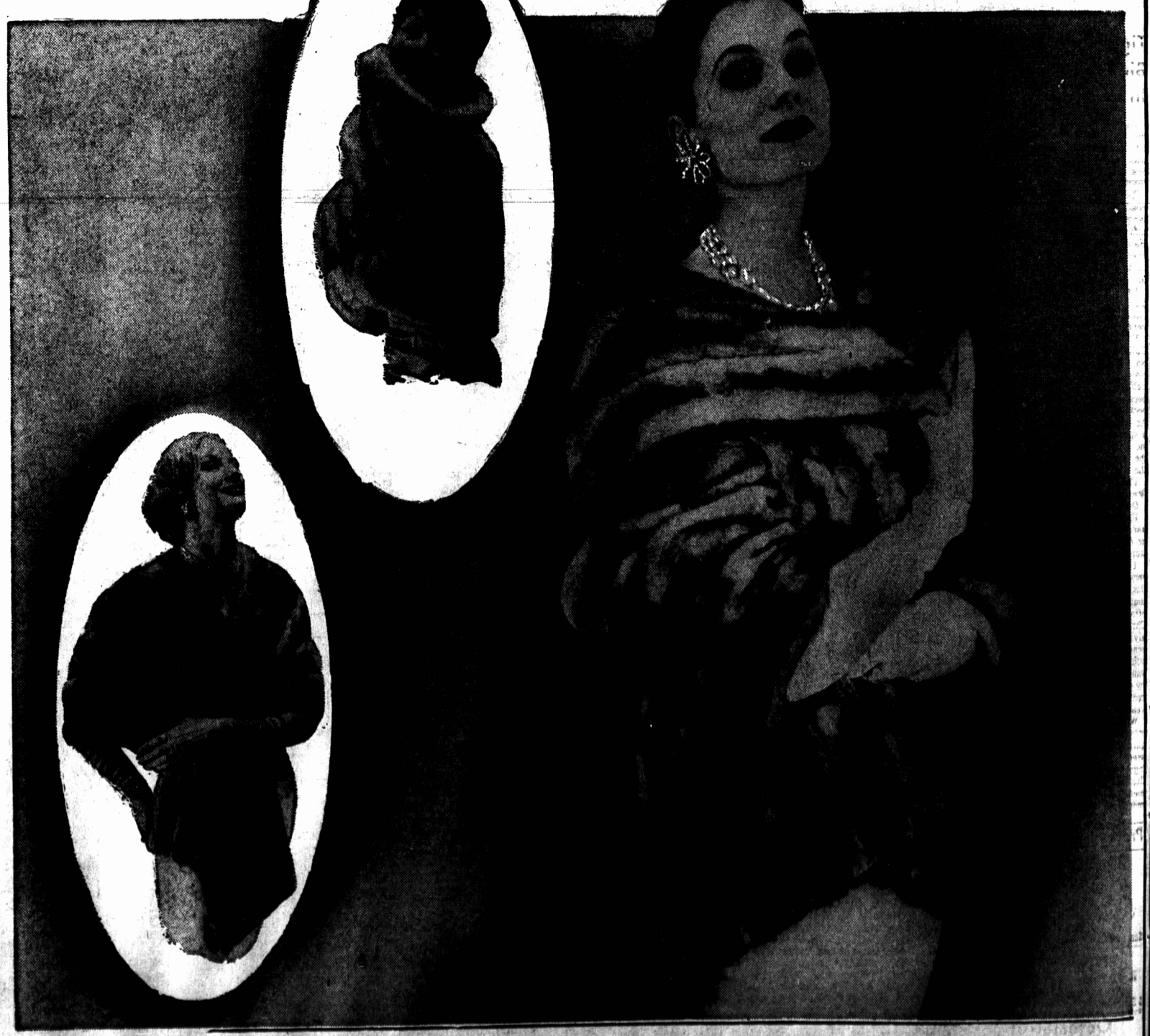
