CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

New Member of School Board Appointed--Other Matters.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening. Mayor Warburton presided, and every member of the Board was in his place.

A letter from Thomas Desmond regarding the burial of dead animal, was laid on the table.

A communication from William G. Mugford, complaining of a nuisance on his premises caused by the building up of the street in his vicinity, was referred to Councillors Horne and Nicholson with power to take action.

In compliance with a request from the Sewer and Water Commissioners it was decided to issue debentures amounting to \$500, for services and extensions in connection with the waterworks system. It was also agreed to issue debentures amounting to \$1000 for preliminary work in connection with sewers, these debentures to be for twenty years instead of forty as asked for.

A letter was read from a number of merchants and other citizens regarding the by-law respecting sidewalks. They urged a modification in the enforcement of this by-law so as to give merchants and others privileges that were enjoyed in many other cities. The letter was laid on the table with the understanding that reasonable discretion was to be exercised in the matter of enforcing the by-law.

Mr. D. Farquharson resigned his position as a member of the City School Board, and Mr. W. S. Stewart was appointed in his place.

A letter was read from Angus Macdonald relating the facts connected with the breaking of the large plate glass pane in the window of his place of business on Queen Street and asking for recompense amounting to \$115. The letter was laid on the table.

A letter was read from Mrs. Catherine McInnis asking for the remission of a year's rent on her place in the market building in consideration of the injuries she sustained some time ago by reason of a defective sidewalk. The rent amounts to \$35. Councillor Taylor gave notice that at the next regular meeting he would move that the amount be given Mrs. McInnis.

A letter was read from Mr. John Bolger regarding a nuisance on his property on Water Street and asking that some action be taken with a view to remedying the condition of affairs which exists there. After Mr. Bolger had been heard at the bar the letter was handed over to Councillors Horne and Nicholson to see what could be done.

It was decided that Bernard Kiggins be employed as a special policeman at the discretion of the Stipendiary Magistrate.

On motion of Councillor Hooper it was decided that the by-law licensing the sale of meat in the city is not to go into force until the 18th of June next.

Councillor Horne gave notice that at the next regular meeting he would introduce a by-law regulating the driving of carriages and bicycles on the park roadway.

On motion of Councillor Taylor the annual license fee for the Masonic Temple Opera House was fixed at \$50.

Council adjourned.
