Summary Of Potato
& Fertilizer Traffic
Through S'side Port

—9240 tons of potatoes in 188,
248 seventy-five or one-hundred
pound bags have been loaded on
nine ships that have visited the
port of Summerside this fall, even
though construction work pre-
vented the use of the new federal
wharf.

In addition to this outgoing car-
go some 10,260 tons of potash and
super phosphate fertilizer was un-
loaded from four ships for the
Canada Packers plant in Sum-
merside.
All of the shipping was handled
by using "Holmans wharf" which
had been rebuilt a year ago, and
this fall through the efforts of
Mr. J. Wilson MacNaught, M.P.,
has been dredged to permit its
use by larger ships than had ever
previously been able to dock at
this wharf. Approximately \$20,745
was paid to local men employed
in the loading of potatoes and un-
loading of fertilizer boats.

The potatoes loaded at Holmans
wharf were handled entirely by
two Summerside firms: Simmons
and MacFarlane and MacFarlane
Produce Co.
