SHARED TREASURE

The Bible has proved itself in history to be "the most valuable thing the world affords." The authorized version played a creative part in the development of our language and the formation of our character. Thoughts For Our Time

TEAMWORK NEEDED

Once again we slip toward mid-October, history and the record book have taken possession of the annual pageant and drama called the world series.

Like all other editions of the classic contest, this series produced its heroes and its villains, its sparkling feats of individual prowess, as well as its disappointments. Yet when all is said and done, the final victor was a team, no matter what the contributions of this or that individual player.

Co-ordination, co-operation, supreme individual effort integrated into the common good of the whole—these are what produced victory for the National League heroes. Individual excellence and ability there must be, but equally important is the co-ordination of these individual abilities into a "team".

From this point of view a baseball team (or indeed, any like group) gives us a sort of view of a miniature society in action. High standards of personal ability and worth, plus a spirit of harmony and unity—these must inevitably characterize a dynamic, living civic community as well as the proud possessors of athletic championships.

We might note, too, that even the ordinary players and plays make their important contributions to the common good of the whole team. The spectacular feats of a Willie Mays or Dusty Rhodes were undoubtedly highly important factors in the final outcome of the series, but their effect could have been nullified by a carelessly fielded routine chance, or the failure to bunt properly at the opportune moment. A winning baseball team requires the contributions of nine men at all times; anything less could well be disastrous.

LIVES AT STAKE
During these days we have here in our own city the opportunity to observe (or rather participate in) a community action or enterprise of very great importance. I refer, of course, to the annual Red Feather appeal. The objective of this effort is not an athletic championship; it is something of far greater significance—the welfare, and even the lives, of the

members of our community. Certainly this is a goal, a prize which should strike us as one worth the greatest effort possible. As we grow and develop a civic community, so does our responsibility in this regard increase and extend itself.

There is a team involved in this struggle, too—a very large team indeed. Its players are legion—every member of the community affected by the campaign. In a word, you and I. This team indeed has its managers, its coaches and its captains, perhaps even its stars. But if its objective is to be attained, the prize to be won, it will be necessary that each player give his utmost in a co-ordinated community effort. It is an opportunity which we have to put forth our best efforts in a common action for the common welfare of the entire team or society, of which we are members and citizens. The victory is within our grasp; it is for us to actually attain it.

NEED TEAMWORK

Despite its magnificent record during the season, the Cleveland team seemed unable to find itself during the world series. Certainly one of the disappointing features to its supporters was the total of men left on base. Failure to hit with men on base is a serious weakness in a team which aspires to victory. In our own "series" the price of victory is a sustained and energetic spirit of co-operation and mutual helpfulness. We must be determined to leave no man "stranded" if we are to reach our goal. There can be no letdown from any player, if the current appeal for funds is to be fully achieved.

The game we are playing, however, is of more than purely earthly significance. Our Lord has often stressed the fundamental necessity of fraternal love for those who would be His disciples. For the Christian, the response to this current appeal can and should be an opportunity to practise concretely the love of his neighbor in and for Christ.

It is a question of motive. While it is a large-scale operation, the Red Feather campaign does not thereby necessarily prevent its participants from making out of it an act of the love of God. Our Lord has promised reward to those who give a cup of water in His Name. We all have the opportunity of per-

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enjoying greater independence, greater activity and better living conditions than ever before," Judge Trainor stated. "Our campaign requirement this year is \$7,350.00 and with the support of the people of Prince Edward Island, we hope to give even better service in the coming year", he concluded.

Newspaper Interview

The Annual Campaign of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind in Prince Edward Island starts on October 18th, announced Judge Trainor, Chairman of the Prince Edward Island Advisory Board to the Canadian National Institute for the Blind.

The Institute makes only one appeal each year in this province. "A generous response from the public is vitally necessary if the Institute is to maintain its standard of services to the blind people in this district," said Judge Trainor. He explained that the object of this service is to train the blind to use their remaining four senses to the best advantage for their own comfort, happiness and independence.

Nearly 1,880 blind people in Canada last year were placed in jobs of various types by the Institute. 2,467 made use of the Library of Braille and Talking Books, which are sent free of charge. 1,677 who had recently lost their sight received the services of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, Home Teachers.
