Teachers Federation Opens Sessions Today

Teachers from across Canada gather at Montgomery Hall this week for the fifth annual meeting of the P.E.I. Teachers and the 49th annual meeting of the Canadian Teachers Federation.

The former organization, a fledgling of the CTF, and known as a "learned society within the teaching profession", will have as one of the keynote topics for discussion the problem of "creating closer relationships between the public, business and education."

Approximately 70 delegates will attend this meeting, which runs July 15-17. National membership for the organization is estimated at 560.

Dr. Fred E. Whitworth will deliver the keynote address on "Education and Manpower". Dr. Whitworth is chief of the education division of the Dominion Government.

Dr. Frank MacKinnon will speak at the annual banquet on Monday night. He is president of the National Union of Teachers in England. Mr. MacKinnon will probably speak at the luncheon on Thursday.

Other speakers for the sessions will include C. Wayne Hall and C. Munroe, professors of education at McGill University's Institute of Education; Dr. Kenneth Walker, superintendent of schools in Charlottetown; Dr. Floyd G. Robinson, Ottawa, director of research for the CTF, and Miss Gene Morrison, Halifax.

Arms Talks Resume Today

GENEVA, Switzerland (Reuters) - The United States has indicated the West might settle for a nuclear test ban treaty without inspection posts on Soviet territory, chief U.S. delegate to the 17-nation disarmament conference resuming today, dropped a clear hint to his Saturday He said it is "perhaps" feasible.

If the West does espouse this position, observers here said, it would be abandoning a long-held policy that has been regarded as virtually irrevocable. But this could lead to a test ban treaty, they said.

U.S. Army Aid Is Offered McGill Program

By HAROLD MORRISON WASHINGTON (CP) - The United States Army has decided to help finance McGill University's high altitude research project, using U.S. Navy gun barrels to fire special instruments projectiles into the upper atmosphere.

An army spokesman said the operation to get the two 142-ton naval gun barrels to Barbados in the West Indies where the project is to be located, started at noon Thursday at Hampton Roads, Va., about 175 miles south of Washington.

Employing a specially-constructed naval flat-top vessel, the two 142-ton gun tubes, each about 75 feet long, were being hoisted aboard the vessel by huge naval and army cranes. The gun barrels or tubes will rest on the vessel in railway flat cars, shipped aboard the vessel along with extra rails for landing purposes.

The army transportation corps handling the shipment described it as the most intricate exercise of its kind and will demonstrate ability to move far heavier single pieces of equipment than anything moving during the Second World War.

PROJECT CALLED 'HARP'
Dubbed project "Harp"-high altitude research project-the McGill experiment so far has proven that projectiles can be fired into the upper atmosphere at low cost by using smooth-bore cannon instead of expensive rocket boosters.

The experiment has previously employed small cannon. Now the concentration will be on the huge naval tubes. In Barbados, the 16-inch naval gun tubes will be fired vertically boosting projectiles perhaps as high as 400,000 feet.

Indian Predicts Weather Change

Rain and more rain falls on P.E.I., dampening spirits, and just as everything dries, and pushing the rainfall scale for the month closer to the 1912 record.

To date this "sunless" month, 4.27 inches of rain has been recorded at the meteorological station at the Charlottetown airport. This is somewhere near four times normal rainfall.

The average rainfall for the month of July is 2.86 inches. Last year only 28 inches fell during the month. The record for the month was set in July, 1912, when 8.8 inches was recorded.

HEAVIEST BLOW
The heaviest blow is being dealt to the tourist industry, but work and construction are also suffering a setback.

No provincial highways work has been done since the first of the month, and City of Charlottetown paving and patching programs have been halted. In addition, work has slowed or halted on a number of private contracts.
