MRS. ALEX. MACLEOD
There passed peacefully away the late Mrs. Alex. MacLeod, nee Mrs. Alexander MacLeod, the late Mrs. MacLeod, nee Mary Emily MacLeod, was born in Kinross, P.E.I. June 23, 1867, a daughter of the late John S. and Harriet MacKenzie.
She received her early education in U.S. School and later graduated from Gordon Perry Hospital, Boston, Mass., with an R.N. degree. Her kindly disposition and patience left fond memories with the many patients entrusted to her care.
In June, 1912, she married Alexander MacLeod, and lived in Montague, P.E.I., moving to Charlottetown in 1923.
Mrs. MacLeod was a faithful member and attendant of Trinity United Church and her place was seldom vacant. For some years she was a member of the choir under Prof. Fletcher. During the time her late husband was treasurer of Trinity Church Mrs. MacLeod gave untiring assistance at all times.
Her illness of the past year was borne with remarkable Christian fortitude and she was never heard to complain.
She leaves to mourn her passing daughter Jessie, Mrs. M. Arthur MacLeod, and three grandsons, David, Donald and Roger MacLeod, in whose welfare and advancement she was keenly interested. Her husband predeceased her, three and a half years ago, and a son, John, predeceased her in 1932.
A brother, Samuel Martin of Fernon, and a sister, Annie, Mrs. W. Jenkins of Charlottetown, survive. One sister, Sadie, and a brother, John Hugh, a student, predeceased her.
The funeral, which was largely attended, was held from Trinity United Church on Saturday, Jan. 19, 1957. The service was conducted by Rev. A. Frank MacLean and Rev. Howard Christie. The Trinity Quartet sang "God is Waiting". Interment was in Valleyfield Cemetery, with service at the grave conducted by Rev. MacLean and Rev. Mr. Sheen. Pallbearers were Harold MacKie, Harold White, Harold Martin, Munroe MacLeod, Ernest S. Coffin and E. Edgar Jardine.

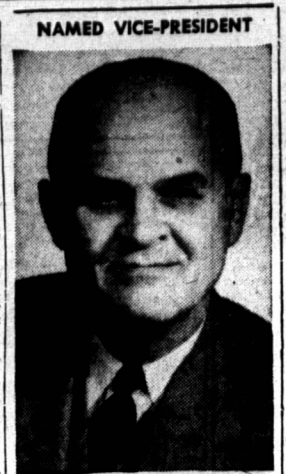

Stock Market In N. Y. Showed Upward Trend During Week

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market consolidated recent gains last week and moved ahead a bit on average.
Wall Street was encouraged that the average turnover remained at more than 2,000,000 shares a day, thus making the brokerage business profitable once more to firms large and small.
Lukens Steel, the fast-stepping issue which has amazed the financial community, started again last week. The short interest in this stock rose to 98,021 shares as of April 15, more than double the 40,770 shares as of March 15.
The jump in 11% to 88% by Lukens was in class by itself for a stock of this price.
The Associated Press average of 60 stocks rose only 50 cents to \$178.80. This was the eighth consecutive weekly rise in the average.
The five most active issues this week on the American Stock Exchange were:
New India Mining, up 1/4 at 14 on 132,000 shares; Pressed Metals of America, up 1-16 at 7; Faraday Uranium, up 5-16 at 3 1/2; Devon-Palmer Oils, up 3-16 at 2 1/2; Canada Southern Petroleum, up 1-16 at 8 3/16.
The five most active issues on the New York Stock Exchange this week were:
Lukens Steel, up 1 1/4 at 88% on 136,500 shares; St. Regis Paper, off 3/4 at 33; Bethlehem Steel, up 1/4 at 44 1/2; Raytheon, up 1 at 22 1/2; and Sperry Rand, up 1 1/2 at 22 1/2.
Aluminium Ltd. led up the Canadian issues on the New York exchange, gaining 9/4 to close at 136. International Nickel was up 4. Granby Mining was unchanged at 9 1/4 and Canadian Pacific slipped 1/4 to 34 1/4.
Among Canadian issues on the American exchange Shawinigan closed at 90, up 1/4 from the previous week's close. Farg. Oil advanced 1/2 to close at 5 and Eureka was unchanged at 1 1/16, a loss of 1/4 on the week's trading.

One-Third Interest Being Sold In Algoma Steel Corp.

TORONTO (CP)—British, Canadian and German interests are acquiring nearly one-third ownership in Algoma Steel Corporation, Ltd., wealthy steel and iron ore company centred at Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.
This was indicated Saturday with announcement that sales have been arranged for 500,000 of Algoma shares which were owned by Sir James Duncanson, former Algoma head who died Jan. 1, 1956.
Issued shares of Algoma total 1,650,000 out of 4,000,000 authorized.
The announcement — made by McMillan, Birch and Company, solicitors for Sir James' estate — said it is expected the sales will be completed by early June.
They are being made as follows:
A. V. Roe Canada Ltd., airplane and airplane-engine manufacturers centred at Malton, Ont., and a member of the British Hawker Siddeley group of companies, 150,000 shares.
McIntyre Porcupine Mines Ltd., 100 shares.
Manneville International, a producer which has large investment funds, 100,000 shares.
Royal Bank of Canada, acting on behalf of a group of British investors, 50,000 shares.
\$50,000.00 DEAL
Manneville International Corporation Ltd., Western Hemisphere associate of Manneville AG of Dusseldorf, Germany, 200,000 shares.
Manneville International, formed last year, has headquarters in Toronto. Another Manneville AG associate, Manneville Tube Co. Ltd., is building a \$20,000,000 steel pipe plant at Sault Ste. Marie.
The shares being sold, the announcement said, consist of 342,000 shares on behalf of the estate and 158,000 on behalf of certain beneficiaries.
The price was not announced but the total of the transactions is assumed to be in the \$50,000,000 or more range.
Much of the money will in effect go to pay the heavy inheritance taxes on Sir James' estate and, in line with federal announcement, specifically go to the Canadian Council for promotion of Canadian culture.
Sir James' will was probated a year ago at \$66,016,546 and it was stated then that probably more than half of it would go for inheritance tax.
In February, Prime Minister St. Laurent said that revenues from the estates of Sir James and Isaac W. Killam, Montreal financier, amounted to just under \$100,000,000 and that the availability of these amounts was one of the considerations the government had in mind when it recommended to Parliament an expenditure of \$100,000,000 for the new Canada Council.
Sir James, who brought Algoma from bankruptcy in the 1930s to its present strong financial position, held 700,000 shares or major controlling interest at his death and presumably the current transaction will leave 200,000 shares in the hands of the estate or beneficiaries.

BUSINESS SPOTLIGHT Says Fair Trading Has Lot To Do With World Peace

Fair trading has a lot to do with peace in the world, in the opinion of R. C. Berkinshaw, president of the Canadian Council of the International Chamber of Commerce, who will head Canada's large delegation to the International Chamber's congress in Naples May 6-11.
Mr. Berkinshaw outlined both his personal philosophy and the things which the Canadian delegation will stand for, in an interview with newspaper men in Toronto.
"If," he commented, "you deal with a man and get to know him and understand him, and if you like him and he likes you, you build up a situation in which he will be willing to work with you."
Economic pressures and the struggle for position in the world, he added, are causes of war.
A newspaper man interjected: "That leads to the question: Should we have more trade with Iron Curtain countries?"
Mr. Berkinshaw replied: "I think it is logical that we should if we want to promote the best understanding and goodwill we are not going to do by saying 'we will have no truck nor trade with you.'"
The Canadian representation at Naples will number more than 70, including 39 delegates, representative of a wide range of Canadian business, many of whom will be accompanied by their wives.
Mr. Berkinshaw said that in such a large delegation there were bound to be differences of opinion. However, ticking off the various congress discussion topics, Canadian attitudes would be about as follows:
International co-operation for economic development: The delegation would back support for the Organization for Trade Co-operation (OTC), the proposed body which would be a permanent secretariat for the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT).
At the Tokyo congress in 1955 the Canadian delegation had won approval for a resolution which asked national councils of the chamber to urge support of the OTC on their respective governments.

Imperial Oil Company Moves To New Head Office In Toronto

Canada's biggest office-moving job was carried out over the week-end.
The move was by Imperial Oil Ltd. from seven old buildings in downtown Toronto to a handsome new 19-storey structure uptown at 111 St. Clair Ave. West.
As a result, 1,100 employees, who have been taking a long week-end holiday, will today walk into a new office home and find in place all their working belongings—desks, typewriters, files and a myriad of other things.
The old and new buildings were each a story in themselves of the growth in Canada's oil industry since Imperial discovered oil at Leduc, Alta., in 1947.
The old buildings were a story of trying to keep up with something that was happening almost too fast to cope with; and the new tells of something accomplished and of a glistering future.
SEARCH FOR SPACE
The main group of old offices straggled through four buildings, fronting in a half-black bounded by King, Church and Toronto streets, and they had been added one by one in a feverish search for space.
They grew, said one staff member, "like Topsy." Roles were punched in walls and long passages were driven through until, as one staff member said, it was like a "rabbit-warren."
Finally, they could grow no more and a new building was decided upon.
The new structure—of whitish-grey granite which changes color with the changing rays of the sun, sometimes to a pink—stands on Toronto's highest land, 500 feet above sea-level. The building, rising nearly another 300 feet, thus looks out over the whole city and can be seen from almost any approach.
The first part of the move, from buildings on University Ave. and Duke Street, was carried out by a crane in advance, but the main
