DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

THE QUEBEC RIVER POLICE.

The Newfoundland Dispute.

OTTAWA, April 12. In the House of Commons yesterday, Hon. C. H. Tupper introduced a bill to repeal the act concerning the harbor and river police of Quebec. The abolition of this act, he said, would be beneficial to the Maritime Provinces, since it would tend to take off retaliation dues imposed by the United States on Canadian vessels. The act to incorporate the Women's Baptist Missionary Union of the Maritime Provinces passed through committee and was read the third time. Mr. Davies asked when the remainder of the papers relating to the Newfoundland dispute would be produced. He referred especially to one despatch of Lord Knutsford which appeared, stating that the British Government threatened to ratify the Blaine-Bond treaty if Canada failed to negotiate a treaty of reciprocity with the United States. Hon. C. H. Tupper said that the Government hoped to receive permission from the Imperial Government to produce the despatch in a few days. After some debate Mr. Ives withdrew his resolution for the imposition of an export duty on sawn logs.

The Canada Temperance Act.

OTTAWA, April 12. In the Senate yesterday Dickey's amendment to apply the principles of the Canada Temperance Act to incorporated towns was buried out of sight. Vidal, Scott and Premier Abbott concurred in the opinion that the amendments, if adopted, would strike a vital blow at the Act, instead of extending the local option principle.

Obituary.

HALIFAX, April 12. D. H. McGarvey, the well known insurance man, died this morning after a brief illness. Mrs. McGarvey, who has been in Florida for her health, is on her way home.

Suicide.

MONTREAL, April 12. Moise Dubois, a messenger in the Sheriff's office, committed suicide yesterday by shooting himself. Financial difficulties are said to have impelled him to the deed.

B. W. Salter, of Halifax, Dead.

HALIFAX, April 12. Mr. B. W. Salter, who at one time carried on extensive business here, died this morning.

Hon. Mr. Peters reported an address prepared by a committee of both Houses, asking the intervention of the C. Colonial Office to prevent the imposition of discriminating duties upon Canadian productions in the ports of Newfoundland.

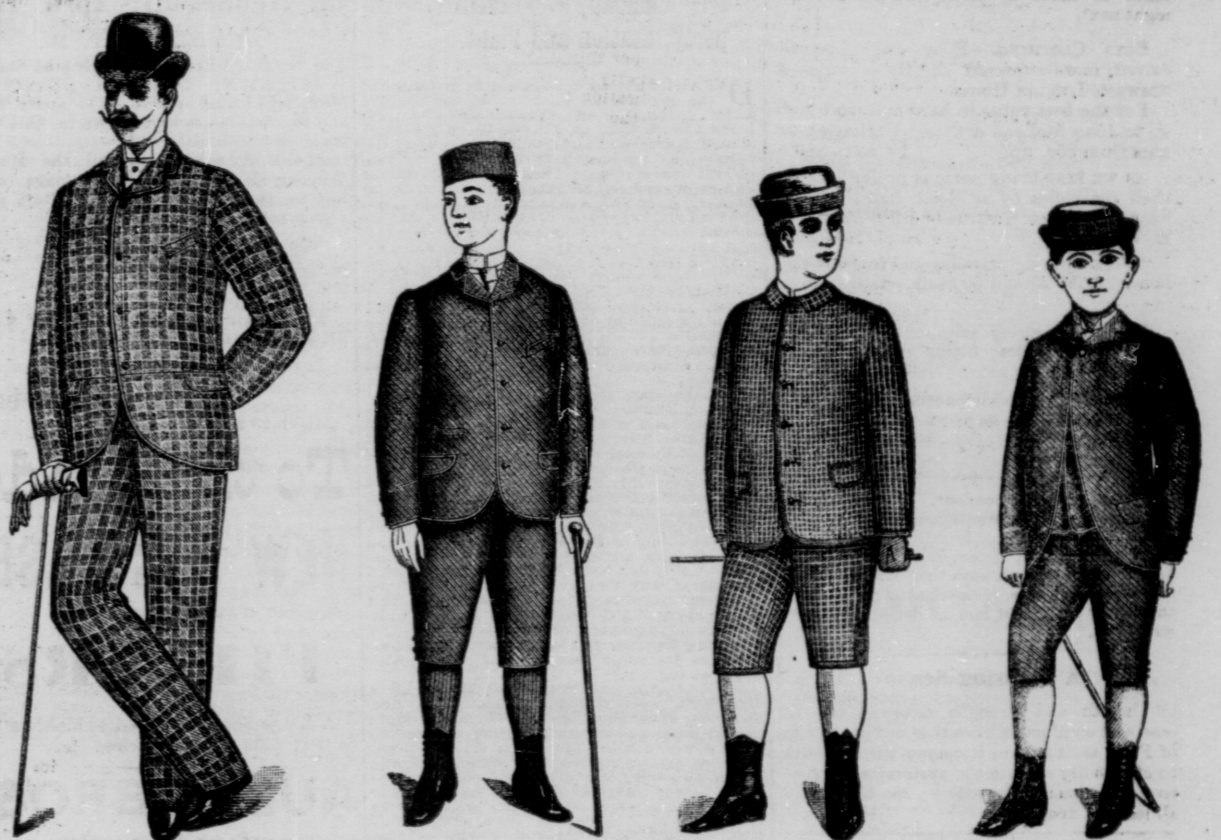

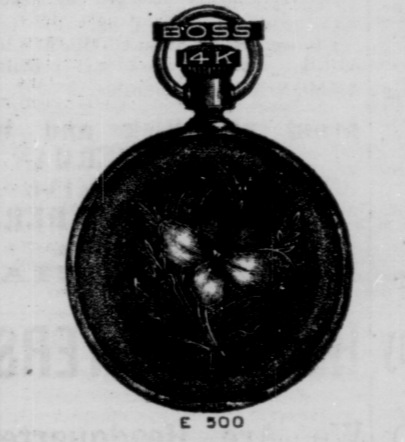
